In our time, Standing Committees are engaged in the consent process on an ongoing basis and develop consistent discernment practices whereby they respond to the dozen or so requests for consent they receive annually. General Convention deputies, because they answer such requests at only one time every three years, because their legislative committee responsibilities and other hearing commitments conflict with consent hearings during the General Convention, and because of the competing demands of legislation on their attention, do not have the luxury of a familiar process as do their colleagues on Standing Committees. As we continue to have higher numbers of episcopal elections each year, it would be good stewardship of leadership resources and would help the consent process to have it consistently carried out by those who exercise this responsibility on a regular basis. As well, it has been very beneficial in some recent episcopal elections to allow Standing Committees and their bishop colleagues to explore together the attendant issues when considering consent requests, something that is difficult to accomplish during the triennial conventions of The Episcopal Church."

The present amendment would clarify how best to handle these anomalous situations. The amendment echoes the current language of Canon III.10.4(a), and would have no effect on present or planned full communion relationships."



According to the Centers for Disease Control, people over the age of 50 account for 23% of AIDS diagnoses in the United States; and it is projected that beginning in 2015, over half of people living with HIV/AIDS in the U.S. will be over 50. Making visible those ravaged by the continuing HIV/AIDS epidemic requires us to know which people are most vulnerable.

EXPLANATION

The 76th General Convention, in approving GC2009 A138 and GC2009 A177, paved the way for a more equitable benefits structure for all employees of the church and church-related institutions. It did not, in passing these resolutions, take sufficient time to consider the impact these changes would have on parishes and institutions subject to the authority of this church. Nor did it consider the difference in scale and impact between parishes and said institutions. It required schools, for example, to make rapid adjustments for a comparatively large number of employees, resulting in yearly budget adjustments, on the average, of \$200,000-500,000.

This resolution calls for an extension of the deadline for compliance, a simplification of the decision-making process for diocese (rather than have to make one decision for one benefit based on a determination of what institutions are "subject to the authority of this church", and another based on different criteria, these resolutions would call for a similar decision-making process with both benefits), and an opportunity for parishes and church-affiliated institutions to initiate a phase-in process over a period of years for the lay employee pension program.

EXPLANATION

Resolution GC2009-A138 allowed for school employees, whose institutions were expected to conform to the new pension standards, to opt for participation in a TIAA-CREF defined contribution plan as an alternative to the Church Pension Group. Surveys taken by both the National Association of Episcopal Schools as well as the Southwest Association of Episcopal Schools, indicate that a substantial number of schools maintain pension programs with vendors other than Church Pension Group or TIAA-CREF.* As with existing defined benefit programs, we believe that an institution should have the option of maintaining its current defined contribution plan, regardless of the vendor, as long as it meets the pension benefits required in A138. To identify one alternative vendor (TIAA-CREF), at the exclusion of others, establishes, we believe, a risky precedent.

*In the 2009 NAES survey, of 102 schools responding, 61 had defined contribution programs with TIAA-CREF, 23 with the Church Pension Group, and 24 with other vendors. In the 2010 SAES survey of its member schools (in Arizona, Louisiana, New Mexico, Oklahoma, and Texas dioceses), of 51 schools responding, 17 had defined contribution programs with TIAA-CREF, 10 with the Church pension Group, and 24 with other vendors.

EXPLANATION

Similar resolutions previously have been concurred by the 75th and 76th General Conventions. Its historic basis acknowledges:

There are an estimated 1.7 million children with a parent in the criminal justice system. The current system of justice is based on retribution; not restoration. In South Africa, for example, the work of the Truth and Reconciliation Commission chaired by Archbishop Desmond Tutu has promoted the healing of communities. In keeping with a culture of restoration, camps for children with parents in the criminal justice system create a culture of healing and not punishment.

These children are often the "invisible" victims of crime, living in poverty and abusive situations, and mostly forgotten by government agencies. They experience fear, guilt, anger, shame, loneliness and poor school performance. A U.S. Senate committee report said they stand a 70 percent chance of also going to prison unless there are intervening circumstances.

Dioceses with summer camps for these children have seen positive change where children and adult staffers are transformed. A week of camp activities, experiencing God's unconditional love and the beauty of nature have helped build life skills, creativity, self-respect, friendships and teamwork. Funds are needed to provide stipends for staff members with skills and training in working with at-risk children; for mentoring and homework help; for transportation and counseling.

Hear the voices of some of these children: "I am 10 years old. When my mom gets out of prison, I'll be 35." "This is the first time in two years that I have felt safe." "I was 9 when my mom got arrested. The police came and took her and just left us there. For nearly two or three weeks I took care of my 1 year-old brother and myself. I wasn't afraid. I just wanted to take care of my brother."

To address this problem, the Convention should encourage bishops, clergy, and laity across the country to welcome with intentional fullness their brothers and sisters in Christ: as living manifestations of faithful witness of Christian welcoming. Hopefully, parishes, the dioceses, and the national church will institute and support ministries to sustain refugees' emotional and physical health and their personal and spiritual wellbeing. We resolve to do these things in faith to build up the full body of Christ.

We encourage bishops, clergy, and laity to become full participants and to identify a position that will be concerned with the development of Sudanese communities and help to fulfill the potential of planting churches in these groups, where appropriate; and when size does not suggest the possibility of sustainable parishes, to encourage ministries that support refugee communities within the fold of larger parish communities.

Needs of Sudanese Congregations:

Sudanese communities need

-Space for worship and Bible study that recognizes and respects the fact that this group requires more than one hour time for their Sunday ministry;

-Sudanese representatives or voices at the level of the parish and diocese [as well as the national Church headquarters];

-planned missions, for Christian teaching, to reach the self-sustaining parish level over a five-year period; [the national church will send teams of senior Sudanese clergy to train and encourage local congregations]

-to be integrated more fully into the Church;

-a shared national process for ordination;

-to build community and nurture families;

-to join hands and work together;

-to address conflict--communal, civic and cultural--between and within linguistic and cultural groups from Sudan;

-to bridge the gap between the lives they lived in the Sudan and the lives they must lead in the US -to collaborate with the Sudanese Council of Churches;

-help from American-born friends to better understand and navigate the American system;

-to share their own unique perspectives with the wider community and to edify and build up the larger church;

-to work as a group;

-help to maintain their belief that God is in their midst;

-help to look for the solution within and rather than outside communities to neutralize hatred and anger

EXPLANATION

Despite the fact that all due process was observed leading up to the adoption of the Revised Common Lectionary by the 75th General Convention, there is considerable anecdotal evidence that many worshiping communities did not begin considering it until its use became mandatory on Advent Sunday 2010. Even though the RCL is now the official lectionary of this Church, it is only now effectively undergoing a period of widespread trial use. Widespread use has revealed a number of concerns. These include the way the length of some readings are edited, the general length of the appointed Psalms, a marked change in theological emphasis in the observance of All Saints' Day, among others. It seems inevitable that the RCL will be altered once again, sooner than later. In the meantime, many communities have grown attached to portions of the 1979 lectionary that have been changed or eliminated by the RCL, portions that have been significantly formative of the spiritual lives of their members. It seems just and considerate to let them, under the guidance of the Bishop, continue to use the lectionary to which they have become accustomed.

The General Convention of 1947 provided for the first time that the Presiding Bishop would resign her/his diocesan jurisdiction in order to dedicate her/himself fulltime to the management of the affairs of the "National (Executive) Council" and the general church. The time is right to reconsider the nature and shape of the office of The Presiding Bishop for the 21st Century. This 77th General Convention will elect the Joint Nominating Committee for the next Presiding Bishop to be elected at the 78th General Convention in 2015. Deleting the canon that requires the Presiding Bishop to resign her/his diocese allows for the Joint Nominating Committee to imagine other models for the Presiding Bishop as part of the ongoing discussions of restructuring of the church. Deleting Title 1, Canon 2, Sec. 3 (a) & (b) does not mean that the next Presiding Bishop must remain in her/his diocesan jurisdiction. He/she could still resign her/his diocese and become a fulltime Presiding Bishop, if appropriate, thus maintaining the current model of the office. Rather, deleting Title 1, Canon 2, Sec. 3 (a) & (b) simply allows for more flexibility and imagination in the nature and shape of the office of the Presiding Bishop as part of restructuring efforts of The Episcopal Church and as The Episcopal Church looks to the election of the next Presiding Bishop.

EXPLANATION

For a very long time, our bicameral system was seen as the church in council. It was understood as a fair representation of the church and it created an atmosphere of shared ecclesial decision-making that honored the voices and opinions of all the baptized. As a structure for a uniquely American denomination it provided representative governance that worked well for a church ministering in a culture where conditions were similar from one triennium to the next.

To all involved in the mission and ministry of the church today, it is clear that this system is failing us, failing the mission of the church. The reasons why are many. It is too expensive. There are too many people involved and invested in the power that comes from a deep and cumbersome organization that has become increasingly bureaucratic. Even among much larger denominations that gather in convention-style deliberation, the General Convention of the Episcopal Church is the largest gathering by far and the most costly. General Convention can no longer claim to be the church in council in its ancient and ecclesial form when it looks and acts more like the national conventions of political parties. And for all of this expense and time we accomplish very little in the way of sustainable mission strategies and program.

We minister in a very different environment from that of our founders, in which the pace of change calls for a nimble church able to easily adapt. Bureaucracies are anything but nimble which is why they are only effective in fairly stable conditions. It is time to set ours aside. The bicameral system needs to be replaced with a unicameral General Convention that meets in sacred council to consider the mission of the church, its programs and budget.

It is time to gather in one place with laity, clergy and bishops meeting together, praying together, talking and listening together and working together for the mission of the church. The unicameral convention could meet with debate and prayerful conversation being exchanged in a common space in which the concept of sacred council could prevail. We may discern that certain decisions require the majority of both deputies and bishops to provide balance and shared authority, but the votes would come following the open, fair and prayerful discernment of a body that met together as one in council. The Convention of the Episcopal Diocese of Missouri recognize and uphold the Reverend Whiting Griswold as an example of Christian sainthood and encourage his recognition within the wider church.

The Reverend Whiting Griswold became first rector of St. John's (St. Louis) in 1841. Along with members of his parish, the Rev. Griswold established Orphans' Home in 1843 and worked diligently to build and strengthen both institutions. He mediated dissension in the newly formed Diocese of Missouri in 1844, following the demise of Kemper College and he represented the Diocese of Missouri at every General Convention.

While many others fled the City of St. Louis during the cholera epidemic of 1849, the Rev. Griswold stayed and ministered to victims of the epidemic in Saint Louis. On July 24, 1849, the Rev. Griswold succumbed to cholera himself and died at the age of 34.

The Rev. Griswold's short, yet exemplary, life and untimely death inspired numerous memorials, including a large marble memorial tablet near entrance to St. John's, a stained glass memorial near the altar at St. John's, a memorial bench in Orphan's Home (since destroyed), and a memorial poem "A Christian Hero" composed by Episcopal priest in Philadelphia.

On July 24, 2011, St. John's Episcopal Church (St. Louis) began an annual recognition of the Rev. Whiting Griswold on the anniversary of his death.

Other than a very minimal decrease in administrative costs, there is no financial benefit for dioceses to participate in the DHP because individual dioceses are neither participating in a larger pool of insured individuals from across the Church nor is the cost of insurance distributed across diocesan lines.

The mandate for all dioceses to participate in the DHP through the Medical Trust prevents dioceses from negotiating for equivalent insurance coverage at a lower cost. Congregations and Dioceses cannot afford to relinquish the financial right and responsibility to secure the best insurance at the least expensive cost.

EXPLANATION

In recent decades the Episcopal Church, with prayerful consideration and deliberation, has consistently moved to being a more inclusive, open and welcoming member of Christ's Body. Such grace is riveted on the teachings and actions of Jesus and the compassionate embrace he had for all...no matter their creed or race. We believe it essential our Liturgy reflect the unconditional hospitality our Lord employed for his mission.

We believe such an open invitation for all to fully participate in the Eucharist is in keeping with our catechism's teaching of grace: Grace is God's favor toward us, unearned and undeserved; by grace God forgives our sins, enlightens our minds, stirs our hearts, and strengthens our wills." (Catechism, p. 858)

We believe appropriate preparation and readiness to receive the spiritual body and blood of Christ is experienced within the unfolding of the Divine Liturgy, providing whatever an individual needs for examination, repentance and forgiveness amid the call to be in love and charity with all people. (Catechism, p. 860)

We know from our strivings within ecumenism and mission that the communion Christ intended for all is perilous and difficult, and that boldness in offering radical hospitality is our calling rather than canonically driven caution.

Attachment to Resolution C040

As Christendom was waning, the Episcopal Church ratified a new identity in the 1979 Book of Common Prayer. This new identity brought us to practice baptismal ministry and made the Eucharist the central part of our Sunday worship. Now, after living this theology for over 30 years, we are faced with the growing practice of Open Table in the Episcopal Church. The two are not unrelated. Perhaps we did not anticipate that we would arrive at the place where we are considering the reversal of the traditional order of Sacraments. Yet, as more and more congregations practice Open Table, we are called to confront the incongruity between practice and traditional theological thinking.

The Episcopal Diocese of Eastern Oregon owes an enormous debt of gratitude to our brothers and sisters in the Episcopal Diocese of Washington who participated in the Valparaiso Project1 for their brilliant, reflective work as articulated in Stephen Edmondson's article "Opening the Table: The Body of Christ and God's Prodigal Grace." 2 We celebrate this work because of its faithful and rigorous theological reflection on the liturgical life of these parishes. We will refer extensively to this article because we find that it conveys an in-depth theological discourse on the practice of Open Table.

First, we hold up that it is indeed "too easy to limit this practice of Open Table to a simple statement about hospitality"3 especially when the implications of this practice constitute such a challenge to our Christian identity. We would, however, expand on this statement by saying that hospitality is never simple. While our instinct of hospitality may be manifest in many of our non-Sacramental, non-liturgical yet traditional practices,4 we recognize these same practices to be born out of our call to ministry. To open our boundaries to the beloved children of God means that we first must understand our relationship to God in a way that empowers us to be Christian ministers. Thus hospitality is always a practice of Christian ministry. Indeed many would say it is the heart of Christian ministry.

Second, we enthusiastically affirm the articulation of communal life in Edmondson's article in these words: "the community of Christ's body has integrity in the midst of these open boundaries because it is defined and held together by its bonds, not its boundaries." 5 Life in Eastern Oregon, as in many rural areas of the Episcopal Church, is one that quite literally is not able to afford the traditional arrangement of parish existence, most notably one priest for each parish. We are a diocese whose people have come to learn the meaning of baptismal ministry through necessity. As such, we have also come to understand these bonds of baptism as powerful and therefore empowering. Yet, instead of yielding a practice of scarcity over the concern that we won't have enough nourishment for ourselves, the norm of baptismal ministry evokes a natural response to offer the Table's gifts because we know ourselves to be servants in response to the grace we experience as baptized members of Christ's Body. We are the Body of Christ and we choose to offer ourselves as sacrament to all the children of God.

Third, we hold deep admiration for the interpretation of the parable of the Prodigal Son6 expressed by the people of Washington. In particular, we wholeheartedly concur the practice of Open Table helps us to see how the forces that prevent us, as prodigal sons and daughters, from returning to our loving parent are not other people, but rather are "the spiritual and material forces that oppress us and separate us from the love of God."7 We understand these forces not to be found naturally in the heart of another human, but rather in the systemic sin of institution as articulated by Walter Wink.8 While we do declare the Church to be Christ's Body, we also must be able to remind ourselves that it is a human institution, indeed our human endeavor to proclaim God's profound and radical love for the whole world incarnate in Jesus Christ. And as a human institution, it is prey to the very forces that oppress and separate. Grace as mediated in the Sacrament of Eucharist, is nourishment for our redemptive work in and with human systems, most especially the very one we have been charged with stewarding.

This redemptive work cannot be done only by those within the system but must involve people outside the system. Therefore, when people feel called to our Table we, as stewards of our Table, are called to welcome them so that we might work together towards redemption. This is not to proclaim that all people are "anonymous Christians,"9 but it is to say that as Christians, we more than anyone should know that the mystery of our Sacraments is beyond our ability to comprehend and, by implication, beyond our ability to contain. Our location as Christians enables us to identify the Holy Spirit at work, not to own it. Nonetheless, we are wholly responsible for stewarding this Table, not to create boundaries as if we could protect the Sacrament, but to point to it and translate to all who come among us that God is incarnate in the flesh of the Son. And we must not be wary, but faithful that the Holy Spirit is present and guiding those who come, while we bring our ministry of service and hospitality to our most sacred place.

This brings us back to mission. The practice of Open Table does more than extend welcome to those who choose to come to the Table with us. This practice calls us to be more intentional about our ministry. It is no longer the responsibility of the cleric to ensure the people at the railing are baptized Christians. It is now each person's responsibility to walk with and stand beside the strangers in our midst as they come to our Table with us. If we as baptized people assume there are going to be strangers among us rather than assume everyone at the Table is an insider, then we learn through liturgical action to take responsibility for ministering to one another. 10 This empowers us to minister to and be in full relationship with all of God's children and leads us to realize more tangibly and more extensively the vows of our Baptismal Covenant. These vows not only guide us in our common life as the Body of Christ, but uphold us in our relationship with all of creation and, indeed, become the very vehicle for mission. If all are invited to the Table where we as baptized members are called to be stewards, then that

stewardship necessarily extends beyond the walls of the church building into creation. There is no more powerful foundation for working together than the shared experience of Sacrament.

We see this time as a cross roads where the practice of Open Table is asking more of us than we are accustomed to giving. It is not easier to have an Open table. On the contrary, it requires much more of us as baptized Christians than the traditional ordering of Sacraments. Open Table asks us to take our baptismal vows more sincerely because we now see ourselves, not the clergy, as stewards of our Table. While we ask the priest to preside at the Table on our behalf, our participation at the Table shifts dramatically when we assume we will be meeting strangers there. Therefore, the practice of Open Table requires a more intentional catechumenate in order to prepare all the baptized to be both stewards of the Table as well as recipients of its grace.

EXPLANATION

The Mission Priorities established by the 76th General Convention include "Growing Congregations and the Next Generation of Faith" and "Strengthening Governance and Foundations for Ministry." The Diocese of Olympia wholeheartedly supports these priorities and asks for the suspension of Resolution A177 because its implementation will inhibit the Church in its attempt to realize them.

In the Diocese of Olympia full implementation of Resolution A177 could benefit a few lay employees and clergy who are scheduled to work "full-time" (at least 1,500 hours per year) and do not presently have medical coverage paid for by their congregation. However, given the precariousness of funding in all congregations, the approach to parity which is mandated by Resolution A177 would likely make this benefit for a few short-lived while distracting the laity and clergy of all the congregations of the Diocese with multiple full-time employees from their Ministry.

Resolution A177 requires that each Diocese establish a minimum level of paid coverage for lay employees and clergy and mandates that any paid coverage offered to lay employees must be offered to clergy, and vice versa. One unintended consequence of Resolution A177 would be that vestries would tend to see the minimum level established by the Diocese as an "accepted standard" and reduce existing paid coverage to this level. Then clergy and lay employees presently receiving more than this minimum would see their benefits package reduced. In the case of clergy whose congregations presently pay premiums for dependents this reduction could be devastating. Yet any attempt by a vestry to transfer lost benefits to another category of remuneration would go against the principle of equity.

Another unintended consequence of Resolution A177 would be that financially hard-pressed congregations would tend to reduce the hours of lay employees and clergy so that they fall under the threshold of eligibility. Ensuring just healthcare benefits for all church employees is a goal that the Diocese of Olympia shares with the drafters of Resolution A177. However, this Resolution threatens to undermine the morale and financial viability of the very ministry vocations on which "Growing Congregations" and "Strengthening Governance and Foundations of Ministry" must depend.

We request therefore that Resolution A177 be suspended, and that any future mandates issued to the Dioceses

and congregations across the United States be designed to aid and encourage diverse Dioceses and congregations to progress on their own terms toward the goals of parity and justice, rather than imposing mandates which lead in the opposite direction.

The House of Bishops of The Episcopal Church met in March 2011 and discussed the uses and applications of the new Title IV. They also acknowledged that there were many questions and concerns over the changes and their possible conflict with the Constitution of the Episcopal Church.

It would be most helpful to the entire Episcopal Church if the 77th General Convention of the Episcopal Church were to begin the process of proposing changes that are found to be necessary or beneficial to the implementation of canons for clerical discipline and to bring them into clearer compliance with the Constitution of the Episcopal Church.

EXPLANATION

The Rt. Rev. James Steptoe Johnston, Bishop of the Missionary District of Western Texas (1888-1916) desired to provide education and skill development for newly emancipated blacks in the mission field. Bishop Johnston traveled to Raleigh, North Carolina, in search of a young, black, female teacher who was gifted with strong faith, spirit, vision, and leadership to make St. Philip's School a success. In 1902, Ms. Artemisia Bowden courageously accepted Bishop Johnston's invitation and assumed leadership of the St. Philip's Vocational Day School for Colored Children in San Antonio, Texas.

She began with less than ten students. She led the school for 52 years, and her efforts resulted in the transformation of a small day school into a fully accredited junior college offering over 100 degree and certificate programs. Today, St. Philip's College has an enrollment of 19,685. St. Philip's College carries the dual designation of being a Historically Black College and a Hispanic Serving Institution. It is one of five Colleges in

the Alamo Community College District and on March 1, 2012 celebrated its 114th anniversary. Her work began 110 years ago, and continues to be an essential piece of the educational system in South Texas. Ms. Bowden earned her Bachelor's degree from St. Augustine's College and was awarded an honorary Master's degree from Wiley College and an honorary Doctor of Pedagogy degree from Tillotson College.

Her participation in various social causes included the Texas Commission on Interracial Relations, the Negro Business and Professional Women's Club, the City Federation of Clubs, the Southern Conference of Christians and Jews, the Coordination Council of Juvenile Delinquency in the Texas Social Welfare Association, the American Friends Service Commission, the Texas T.B. Association of Bexar County and the National Association of College Women's Clubs.

Her visionary leadership at St. Philip's, as well as in the community, earned her recognition as one of ten outstanding women in the field of education by the National Council of Negro Women in 1946 and she was honored as the Zeta Phi Beta's Woman of the Year in 1955. Bowden Elementary School of the San Antonio Independent School District was named in her honor in 1971.

Dr. Bowden died in 1969, after a full and rich life of faith in Christ and fidelity to Christ's Church, having served both the School and St. Philip's Church in the Diocese of West Texas for over sixty-seven years.

As racial reconciliation remains a high priority for this Church in our own day, it is highly appropriate to honor the life, courage, and ministry of this faithful lay woman by including her in the Calendar of the Church.

EXPLANATION

The purpose of this proposed amendment to Title IV of the Canons of the General Convention is to accommodate those Dioceses wanting to exercise greater flexibility in adapting Title IV to the particular circumstances of their Diocese. This greater flexibility is consistent with Article IX of Constitution of the General Convention which provides that Clergy canonically resident in a Diocese are to be "tried by a Court instituted by the Convention thereof." None of the proposed changes would be mandatory. Dioceses may adapt alternative provisions should their Conventions so choose, as the Constitution of the General Convention already contemplates. In fact, Title IV itself already expressly provides for many instances in which each Diocesan Convention may provide in its own way for the implementation of Title IV. These amendments would simply add additional areas in which the Title IV would expressly permit such local variations, as the Constitution already contemplates.

Specifically, under the proposed amendment, a Diocesan Convention could implement Title IV in that Diocese to provide for the following additional local variations: (a) a Conference Panel might be required under some circumstances to consist of more than one member of the Disciplinary Board, e.g upon request of the Respondent; (b) selection of Panel members from among the Disciplinary Board could be done by means other than casting lots, allowing the President to use his or her discretion to select the best suited members to assume the most appropriate roles; (c) allow the President of the Disciplinary Board to serve on a panel; (d) requiring that the Reference Panel act by unanimous vote rather than by majority vote; (e) allow the Reference Panel to refer a matter directly to a Hearing Panel in some circumstances, e.g. upon request of the Respondent; (f) alter the rule that hearsay is always admissible, e.g. by providing that hearsay is only admissible if the panel permits its introduction; and (g) alter the rule that would require all members to testify to permit Diocesan Canon to provide that Respondents will not be compelled to testify.

Each Diocesan Convention would then decide whether any of these additional local variations would be advisable to provide for greater flexibility in administering Title IV in that Diocese or to restore some fundamental due process protections for Respondents.

In effect, this amendment simply requires that a Bishop Diocesan inform the Intake Officer whenever he/she believes that an Offense may have occured.

EXPLANATION

This resolution is submitted pursuant to the passage of Resolution 12-12 of the Diocesan Convention of the Episcopal Diocese of San Diego on February 11, 2012. The action to provide funding for seminarians by the 76th General Convention was a modest but historic step for The Episcopal Church to join other major denominations in the United States that have central funding sources to support seminarians in their education, training and formation. While the 76th General Convention's funding of \$200,000 over the triennium combined with SIM's traditional funding from SIM's endowment provided record high levels of SIM scholarships in the triennium ending 2012, the amount per seminarian remained small in relation to the complete costs of seminary, which can be greater than \$40,000 per year at certain seminaries.

Without strong central funding source for persons answering the call to serve The Episcopal Church as future ordained leaders, seminarians without strong parish or diocesan financial support are disadvantaged and often finance theological education with seminary education debt. Disparities exist in seminarian funding depending on the sponsoring diocese or parish.

The now perennial problem of seminarian debt has improved with the actin of the 2009 General Convention

but is far from resolved. The issue of funding theological education dates back to the 62nd General Convention (1970) that called for direct financial support from parishes to the seminaries of the Episcopal Church. The topic of how the Church funds theological education has been the topic of resolutions at subsequent General Conventions.

Identifying and nourishing future ordained leaders for The Episcopal Church is necessary for the Church to flourish and grow in these changing times. How the institutional relationship with future ordained leaders begins is an opportunity for a mutually beneficial relationship between a priest and the Church. Realistically funding seminarian education will help newly graduated seminarians answer their calling, parishes afford the newly ordained to minister to parish needs and The Episcopal Church to increase the ministry. SIM has introduced the Circle of Seminarian Friends as a grass roots monthly giving solution to funding seminarian education in The Episcopal Church. If 5% of the Church's average Sunday attendance gave at SIM's suggested rate of \$18.57 per month, enough revenues would be generated to cover the tuition costs of the annual average of 450 Episcopal seminarians.

Although the Episcopalian in the pew readily grasps the importance of investing and encouraging the Church's future ordained leaders, it will take years to reach the 5% level. Until that milestone is reached, General Convention needs to continue and indeed to grow the funding support for her future ordained leaders.

EXPLANATION

The Episcopal Church has long supported a just peace in the Palestinian/Israeli conflict. It has rejected anti-Semitism while affirming the right to be critical of Israeli policies, and has taken clear positions opposing suicide bombings, development of illegal settlements, the building of a separation barrier that violates Palestinian land, and the demolition of Palestinian homes, among other policy positions.

This resolution asks Executive Council to give greater attention to these policies and to develop a high profile and multi-pronged effort throughout the Church to promote a just peace for the two peoples of the Holy Land.

The Christian Church in the Holy Land is struggling to survive as its numbers decline steadily under Israel's ongoing military occupation of Palestine and its ensuing negative impacts on the Palestinian people in the form of economic hardships, loss of basic freedoms, and violence. Today, Christians number less than 2% of the population, down from an estimated 15% to 20% in 1968. Their voices, as found in "Kairos Palestine", reflect the oppression not only of Christian Palestinians, but also of all Palestinians living under the Occupation and within the State of Israel, which they decry as a "Sin against God and humanity." (See full text of Kairos Palestine at www.kairospalestine.ps/)

The Episcopal Diocese of Jerusalem shares in that decline as its members face increasing difficulties such as the 2010 cancellation of Bishop SuheilDawani's 'Residency Permit' and the accompanying order for him to leave the country. That is simply a newsworthy example of things regularly confronted by less titled Palestinians.

Most Episcopalians and most Americans are unaware of the extent of the hardships facing Palestinians and need education on the situation to enable our support. In addition to its teaching series on the Palestinian-Israeli conflict, entitled Steadfast Hope: The Palestinian Quest for Just Peace, the Presbyterian Church has published a three-part study guide for the Kairos Palestine Document issued by a broad representation of Palestinian Christians in November 2009. In addition, an Episcopal version of Steadfast Hope, published in 2011 and based on an updated Presbyterian original, is now available and could be used by Council to develop a study plan for the Church.

Funds of \$5000 to carry out the purposes of this resolution would be for basic materials and resources. Other line items in the budget could be used to assist in this resolution to be determined by staff. 

The Christian Church in the Holy Land is struggling to survive as its numbers decline steadily under Israel's ongoing military occupation of Palestine and its ensuing negative impacts on the Palestinian people in the form of economic hardships, loss of basic freedoms, and violence. Today, Christians number less than 2% of the population, down from an estimated 15% to 20% in 1968. Their voices, as found in "Kairos Palestine", reflect the oppression not only of Christian Palestinians, but also of all Palestinians living under the Occupation and within the State of Israel, which they decry as a "Sin against God and humanity." The Episcopal Diocese of Jerusalem shares in that decline as its members face increasing difficulties such as the 2010 cancellation of Bishop SuheilDawani's 'Residency Permit' and the accompanying order for him to leave the country. Most Episcopalians and most Americans are unaware of the extent of the hardships facing Palestinians and need education on the situation to enable our support. In addition, an Episcopal version of Steadfast Hope, published in 2011 and based on an updated Presbyterian original, is now available and could be used by Council to develop a study plan for the Church.

EXPLANATION

The Rev. Hiram Hisanori Kano (1889-1986), an Episcopal priest known by some as the "Saint of Nebraska and Colorado," was an agricultural missionary among Japanese Americans in western Nebraska and a pastor to American soldiers imprisoned for having been AWOL while he himself was a prisoner during the Japanese internment of WWII. Churches in the Dioceses of Nebraska and Colorado observe a Saint's day for Fr. Kano annually.

Fr. Kano, who was from a well-known family in Tokyo, received a Master's degree in agriculture from the State University of Nebraska. In the early 1920's, Bishop George Allen Beecher of the Missionary District of Western Nebraska discerned in farmer and educator Kano, the evangelist he was seeking to call Nebraska's Japanese to be God's people. A lay missionary first, Kano would become Deacon Kano in 1928 and Fr. Kano in 1936. By the spring of 1934 there were 250 baptized and 50 confirmed through Fr. Kano's ministry.

On the morning of December 7, 1941, Fr. Kano had just celebrated the Eucharist at Episcopal Church of Our Savior in North Platte, Nebraska, 180 miles from his wife and children at their Scottsbluff home. On that morning he was arrested by the local police and not allowed to notify his family of his detention, but was sent to the district attorney in Omaha. He heard the terrible news of the bombing of Pearl Harbor and the declaration of war on Japan on the police car radio. Because his family in Japan had connections with the Japanese government, and he was so personally influential with the Japanese Americans as both a minister and a teacher of agriculture, he was rated "Class A – the most potentially dangerous of Japanese Americans." He was the only Japanese of the 5,000 living in Nebraska, Colorado, and Wyoming to receive this rating and to be interned.

Despite his own defense and pleas from his bishop who knew Fr. Kano to be a dedicated Christian and loyal to his adopted country, he spent the next two years in internment camps. He spent time in four different states, always working to help the other internees and those imprisoned AWOL soldiers. He served as dean of a school for the internees and taught many courses in Agricultural Study and English, and he preached the gospel.

After the war, it was determined that Fr. Kano should not return to his ministry in Nebraska. He had been

detained longer than most, and it was feared that folks in Nebraska would be unaware of his loyalty to the U.S. and only remember inflammatory headlines such as, "Alien Pastor Arrested by FBI . . . Admits Writing to Tokyo." He was sent to an Episcopal Seminary in Wisconsin where he earned both Bachelors and Masters of Divinity degrees. He returned to Nebraska and his ministry in 1946.

Fr. Kano and Mrs. Kano earned their citizenship soon after the law permitted it in 1952, and then began teaching citizenship classes so that between 1953 and 1955, nearly 100 percent of the Nebraska Japanese became citizens. Forty years after WWII, when the U.S. government acknowledged that Japanese Americans had been wronged by the internments and offered to pay reparations, Fr. Kano told his bishop, "I don't want the money. God just used that as another opportunity for me to preach the gospel."

While our Constitution and Canons state that we will have Provinces, which Dioceses are in each Province, and the power invested in the Provincial Synods, there is no articulation of the purpose of the Provinces. One of the consequences of this omission is confusion about the need for and/or role of Provinces. A canonical definition of the primary purpose of Provinces provides: 1) a common reference point for initiating, developing, and evaluating Provincial ministries, and 2) a basis for understanding the place of Provinces in the Church's current and future conversations around re-structuring for ministry and governance.

"All that is necessary for the triumph of evil is that good men do nothing" - attributed to Edmund Burke The Episcopal Church has recognized that the sexual abuse of minors is often not brought to light until many years after the date of the abuse and has drawn generous statues of limitations in such cases (see Canon IV. 14.4 (a) (1) (iii) and (iv).) When a clergy person has reason to suspect that the sexual abuse of a minor is taking place the lack of action can lead to unnecessary continued abuse of the minor or put other minors into danger of abuse. Most states have policies and procedures mandating professionals working with children, including clergy, to report suspected abuse of minors.

Unfortunately the church has at times been badly served by clergy who have covered up the sexual abuse of minors by members of the clergy. The negative results of such cover-ups fall into two categories. The first, and most troubling, is that often the abuse has continued, sometimes with multiple victims when the victims could have been protected. The physical, emotional and spiritual damage to the victims of such abuse cannot be overstated. The second, less troubling but still significant, is that when such cover-ups become public the Church loses credibility within the community. It is imperative that the Episcopal Church makes a definitive statement that those who have, perhaps unintentionally, aided and abetted the sexual abuse of minors by the failure to act will be prosecuted by Canon Law.

EXPLANATION

For a decade the Diocese of El Camino Real has been significantly impacted by the deep faith and witness of Episcopal, Roman Catholic and Presbyterian Sudanese refugees who began arriving in San Jose in 2001. A ministry was established at Trinity Cathedral, but the witness of their faith born out of suffering has been felt throughout the diocese. The Sudanese were fortunate in having so many American friends in many congregations awaken to their presence, to act as mentors and tutors and see to the establishment of the nonprofit scholarship program, Hope With Sudan. In 2004 the Diocese established a Feast Day for the Martyrs of Sudan that was incorporated in the Calendar of Holy Women and Men for the whole Church in 2009.

This resolution is meant to accomplish two things:

1) to celebrate the 10th anniversary of the inspiration and witness that the Sudanese have given to hundreds of people in our diocese and for the rich connections that have been made with the struggling Church in Sudan. We celebrate with them the birth of the Republic of South Sudan.

2) to join with a coalition of some of the sixty dioceses across the country that have Sudanese ministries to address the critical problem of inadequate support or attention to Sudanese Christians in their midst. A common problem is that Sudanese refugees in many parts of the country have not felt fully welcomed by their own Episcopal Church and as a result are leaving for other denominations. The Presiding Bishop addressed this issue at the September 2011 meeting of the House of Bishops.

To address this problem the Convention commends our the bishop, clergy, and laity across this diocese for their support and encourages other bishops, clergy and laity to welcome their brothers and sister in Christ who have much to offer to communities of faith. The Sudanese are survivors of decades of suffering and genocide. The sharing their faith journeys has been transformative in the congregations of the dioceses, a witness of what humans can bear, even as children and binding us together as one common humanity.

Nationally, the Office of Black Ministry of the Episcopal Church Center assumed shepherding a network work which had begun in the Sudanese Ministry Network of Province VII and the American Friends of the Episcopal Church in Sudan. In 2008 a Sudanese Leadership Initiative Network was formed. The Rev. Jerry Drino, Executive Director of Hope With Sudan, has been an integral part of this development since 2003 along with

Sudanese leaders in San Jose. The following represent the Needs of Sudanese Congregations that we want to communicate to the larger Church:

To help to maintain their belief that God is in their midst and that there are welcoming and inviting Episcopal communities in which they can grow and be integrated more fully into the Church, joining hands to work together for mission; Space for worship and Bible study that recognizes and respects the fact music and prayers of this group requires more than one hour time for their Sunday ministry;

To form leaders to sustain and grow their ministries with the option of support for persons nominated to the ordained ministries and to find shared, culturally sensitive process for ordination;

To choose representatives as voices at the level of the parish and diocese;

To share their own unique faith perspectives with the wider community and to edify and build up the larger church; to receive help from American-born friends to better understand and navigate the American system;

To help plan missions that connect them with other Sudanese and immigrant communities and strategies to reach a self-sustaining level for their ministry support over a five-year period, where the size of the community merits;

Pastorally, to build community and nurture families; To address conflict as it arises interpersonally, communally, and in the public sector between and within linguistic and cultural groups from Sudan and the larger American culture;

EXPLANATION

Every year in the U.S. billions of dollars in wages are taken from millions of workers. Each of these workers is the victim of wage theft. Wage theft occurs when workers are not paid all their wages, denied minimum wage or overtime pay they are due, or are not paid at all for the work they perform. In any economic climate this creates a difficult and unjust burden on the worker. In our current recession the burden becomes almost impossible. Various academic surveys have found that far from being a small, contained issue, wage theft is a national epidemic. A 2009 survey of low-wage workers in New York, Chicago and LA revealed that one in four workers was not paid the minimum wage. Of those who worked overtime, 76 percent were not paid for it. The survey also found 10 percent of tipped workers have their tips stolen. The average low-income worker loses approximately \$2600 per year in unpaid wages: \$2,634 out of total earnings of \$17,616 (Broken Laws, Unprotected Workers: Violations of Employment and Labor Laws in American Cities, 2009). Wage theft does not only affect low-wage workers. Many middle-class workers are victims as well.

Payroll fraud, when an employer intentionally lies about having employees and calls workers independent

contractors, is a widespread form of wage theft in particular sectors like residential construction, the back of the house in restaurants (cooks and dishwashers), janitorial services, and driving. Although there are legitimate independent contractors, when the employer decides that a worker is an independent contractor and not the worker him or herself, fraud is usually involved. When businesses commit payroll fraud, they don't pay the employer side of payroll taxes, unemployment insurance, and workers compensation insurance, and they exempt workers from a range of workplace protections. Payroll fraud not only steals from workers, but it also steals from public treasuries. Ethical employers who pay workers fairly and legally are placed at a competitive disadvantage when others commit payroll fraud. Payroll fraud is common practice in many contracted services, which is why congregations and individuals must ask how workers are paid when seeking to hire contracted services. (For more information on payroll fraud and wage theft, read Wage Theft in America: Why Millions of Americans are not Getting Paid and What We Can Do about It by Kim Bobo, 2011.)

Episcopalians are concerned about wage theft for several reasons. First, we recognize that "Thou Shalt not Steal" applies to both workers and employers. Workers should be loyal and trusted employees, and thus should never steal from their employers. Employers should treat workers with respect and dignity, including paying them for all their work.

Second, given the widespread nature of wage theft in America, Episcopalians recognize that stopping wage theft will help alleviate poverty, a major concern for The Episcopal Church.

Third, Episcopal congregations are filled with many ethical business leaders. They pay people fairly and legally. Stopping and deterring wage theft makes sure these ethical business leaders are not undercut by businesses that underpay workers.

Fourth, The Episcopal Church cares about the economic health of the nation. There is no better and more direct way to stimulate the economy than to put more money into the hands of low-wage workers. Stopping and deterring wage theft will do just that.

The resolution calls for Episcopal congregations to learn more about wage theft in their own communities, partner with workers centers and wage enforcement agencies to stop and deter wage theft, ask questions of those who provide contracted services, and advocate local, state, and national policies to strengthen educational outreach to workers about and enforcement of wage laws.

There are many ways congregations can learn more about wage theft. If the congregation has an adult study group, consider using the Congregational Study Guide in the appendix of Wage Theft in America to learn more about the issues.

Congregations often hire janitorial firms, landscaping firms or construction firms. All these firms should be asked how they pay people before a contract is signed.

Across the nation, states and local municipalities are figuring out how to strengthen outreach to workers about their rights and enforcement of wage laws. Congregations can partner with enforcement agencies and workers centers to reach out to low-wage and immigrant workers. Congregations can also advocate strong policies for enforcing wage laws with appropriate local, state, or national leaders. Connect with a local workers center or Interfaith Worker Justice affiliate to learn more about local opportunities. (Visit www.iwj.org.)

Wage theft can be stopped and deterred by local actions as well as collective congregational actions. If we want to be ethical consumers, we must ask workers how they are paid. If you plan on leaving your tip on a credit card, make sure the worker will get the tip (10 percent of tipped workers don't get their tips). If you hire a firm to mow your lawn, shovel your snow, clean your house, or repair your roof, you should ask how the workers are paid. Are they paid as employees or are they paid as independent contractors (given 1099 tax forms). Generally speaking, you should only hire firms that pay workers as employees.

The Convention has significant purchasing power. Thus it is important that the Convention make sure that hotels and catering firms with which it contracts are paying people fairly and legally. Hotels, restaurants, and catering firms are sectors that are rife with wage theft.

Each Labor Day weekend, Interfaith Worker Justice coordinates a national educational program called Labor in the Pulpits. This program offers worship aids, bulletin inserts and other resources to assist congregations in lifting up labor issues over Labor Day weekend. Episcopal congregations are urged to take advantage of these free resources by visiting www.iwj.org.

EXPLANATION

The Episcopal Network for Economic Justice carries forward the mandate of the 1988 General Convention entitled "Taking Action for Economic Justice." ENEJ's mandate was affirmed by the 2006 General Convention in the form of C012, which provided funding for dissemination of a how-to manual on economic justice activities including education, advocacy, community organizing, and community investment. During the current triennium, ENEJ has received \$4,550 per annum plus additional special purpose support from Jubilee Ministries. The 2009 resolution C049 mandated Executive Council to develop a strategy for promoting economic justice. Our current resolution suggests that supporting the work of grassroots networks is a vital part of such a strategy.

Episcopal Church support for ENEJ is matched by support from 20 member dioceses, 15 parishes and organizations, and individual member donations. ENEJ collaborates with the Episcopal Public Policy Network, the Episcopal Urban Caucus, Interfaith Worker Justice, and the Episcopal Ecological Network (EpEN) as well as the Office of Economic and Environmental Affairs and Jubilee Ministries. It provides financial and activity reports to Executive Council through the block grant reporting process.

Continued funding will be used to strengthen our collaboration with EpEN and to continue to produce resources such as our how-to manual, issue papers, community investing resources, education modules, Twenty Years Later (an analysis of seven national and global issues) and to expand our reach through the internet and provincial conferences.

It is incumbent on the Episcopal Church to respond to the fact that American middle class and working class people are losing ground. Worldwide poverty is decreasing but that is not so in the United States. We are losing ground. In response, ENEJ continues to develop resources to help Episcopalians to engage in concrete efforts to reverse the trend toward increased economic insecurity and related deterioration of individual, family, and community well-being.

We believe that ENEJ has become an effective vehicle for extending the work of the Diversity, Social and Environmental Ministries Team. It is also an effective partner to other networks which help carry out the Church's mission.

EXPLANATION

The Episcopal Church has long supported a just peace in the Palestinian/Israeli conflict. It has rejected anti-Semitism while affirming the right to be critical of Israeli policies, and has taken clear positions opposing suicide bombings, development of illegal settlements, the building of a separation barrier that violates Palestinian land, and the demolition of Palestinian homes, among other policy positions.

This resolution asks Executive Council to give greater attention to these policies and to develop a high profile and multi-pronged effort throughout the Church to promote a just peace for the two peoples of the Holy Land.

The Christian Church in the Holy Land is struggling to survive as its numbers decline steadily under Israel's ongoing military occupation of Palestine and its ensuing negative impacts on the Palestinian people in the form of economic hardships, loss of basic freedoms, and violence. Today, Christians number less than 2% of the population, down from an estimated 15% to 20% in 1968. Their voices, as found in "Kairos Palestine", reflect the oppression not only of Christian Palestinians, but also of all Palestinians living under the Occupation and within the State of Israel, which they decry as a "Sin against God and humanity." The Episcopal Diocese of Jerusalem shares in that decline as its members face increasing difficulties such as the 2010 cancellation of Bishop SuheilDawani's 'Residency Permit' and the accompanying order for him to leave the country. That is simply a newsworthy example of things regularly confronted by less titled Palestinians.

Most Episcopalians and most Americans are unaware of the extent of the hardships facing Palestinians and need education on the situation to enable our support. In addition to its teaching series on the Palestinian-Israeli conflict, entitled Steadfast Hope: The Palestinian Quest for Just Peace, the Presbyterian Church has published a three-part study guide for the Kairos Palestine Document issued by a broad representation of Palestinian Christians in November 2009. In addition, an Episcopal version of Steadfast Hope, published in 2011 and based on an updated Presbyterian original, is now available and could be used by Council to develop a study plan for the Church.

Funds of \$5000 to carry out the purposes of this resolution would be for basic materials and resources. Other line items in the budget could be used to assist in this resolution to be determined by staff. Some of the work

would be in the office of Communications, the Corporate Social Responsibility committee of Council, and the Economic Justice Loan Committee of Council in addition to work done in Mission Program, both in New York and Washington.

We believe that daily Bible reading can transform millions lives and countless churches.

In 2011, 180 members of St. Thomas Church in Fort Washington, Pennsylvania and 86 friends from beyond committed to join The Bible Challenge and read the entire Bible using printed Bibles or reading the Bible on iPads, iPhones, Kindles and Nooks or listening on CD.

St. Thomas Church has now created The Center for Biblical Studies to promote The Bible Challenge across the United States and around the world. Ten days after launching the new CBS website, over 2,000 visitors from more than 30 countries around the world had logged on the CBS website at:

The Archbishop of Canterbury Rowan Williams, the Secretary General of the Anglican Communion Kenneth Kearon and the former Presiding Bishop of the Episcopal Church Frank Griswold serve on the CBS Advisory Board.

Participants in The Bible Challenge read three chapters of the Old Testament, one psalm and one chapter of the New Testament daily in order to read the entire Bible in a year. Today, Christians number less than 2% of the population, down from an estimated 15% to 20% in 1968. Their voices, as found in "Kairos Palestine", reflect the oppression not only of Christian Palestinians, but also of all Palestinians living under the Occupation and within the State of Israel, which they decry as a "Sin against God and humanity." 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Most Episcopalians and most Americans are unaware of the extent of the hardships facing Palestinians and need education on the situation to enable our support. In addition to its teaching series on the Palestinian-Israeli conflict, entitled Steadfast Hope: The Palestinian Quest for Just Peace, the Presbyterian Church has published a three-part study guide for the Kairos Palestine Document issued by a broad representation of Palestinian Christians in November 2009. In addition, an Episcopal version of Steadfast Hope, published in 2011 and based on an updated Presbyterian original, is now available and could be used by Council to develop a study plan for the Church.

Funds of \$5000 to carry out the purposes of this resolution would be for basic materials and resources. Other line items in the budget could be used to assist in this resolution to be determined by staff. Some of the work would be in the office of Communications, the Corporate Social Responsibility committee of Council, and the Economic Justice Loan Committee of Council in addition to work done in Mission Program, both in New York and Washington.

Hiram Kano was born in Tokyo, Japan in 1889. When William Jennings Bryan came to Japan, the Kanos hosted his visit. The visitor from the west sparked in young Kano an intense desire to travel to the United States and especially to Bryan's home state.

While young Kano was in school in Japan he nearly died of a ruptured appendix. The doctors told his parents his case was hopeless and he remembers at one point that a nurse took his pulse and announced that it had stopped. Though he was ready and willing to die, there came to him a great sense of calm and he was granted a vision of God. An interior vision of light that was somehow more than light. In his own words he

"surrendered" and his recovery began. One hundred days after the vision he left the hospital. He began to read the bible and became convinced that his vision had been of the risen Christ. In 1910 he was baptized into the body of Christ by a Dutch Reformed Missionary.

In 1916 he heard God calling him to go to America. There his skills could best be put to good use in helping the many young Japanese who were immigrating to the United States to work. He came then to Lincoln, Nebraska where he earned a Masters Degree in Agricultural Economics at the University of Lincoln.

When legislation was introduced in the Unicameral that discriminated against the Japanese in the state, Kano was asked by his fellow countrymen to do what he could to turn aside the disastrous law. He enlisted the aid of Bishop George Allen Beecher then bishop of the Missionary Diocese of Western Nebraska. Together they managed to speak to many of the members of the unicameral. The subsequent law was much less harsh to Asians in Nebraska.

Through this contact with Mr. Kano, Bishop Beecher was impressed enough to ask him to become a missionary to the Nisei (people of Japanese descent) in the North Platte Valley. After many visits to his farm, Beecher finally persuaded Kano to take up this ministry. In 1925 the Kanos moved to Mitchell, NE. Ordination to the order of Deacon took place in 1928 followed by ordination to the Priesthood in 1936.

On December 7, 1941, the Japanese Imperial Navy attacked Pearl Harbor. American reaction against Japanese immigrants was swift and harsh. Fr. Kano was arrested by agents of the F.B.I. that very afternoon on the steps of the Church in North Platte. His family who were waiting for him at home would not see him for four years while he moved from one prison to another. After his release, Fr. Kano would reflect on those years noting that in the five different prisons he had five congregations to serve and thanking God for the grace to carry out his ministry wherever he went.

No matter where he was in the years following that momentous decision in 1925 to his death on October 24, 1988, Fr. Kano interpreted the events in his life as opportunities for ministry. Among the Nisei in the North Platte Valley, in numerous prisons, even in retirement in Colorado, Fr. Kano was a Pastor who cared for the flock wherever he was.

EXPLANATION

The Episcopal Church has long supported a just peace in the Israeli/Palestinian conflict. It has rejected anti-Semitism while affirming the right to be critical of Israeli policies, and has taken clear positions opposing suicide bombings, development of illegal settlements, the building of a separation barrier that violates Palestinian land, and the demolition of Palestinian homes, among other policy positions.

This resolution asks Executive Council to give greater attention to these policies and to develop a high profile and multi-pronged effort throughout the Church to promote a just peace for the two peoples of the Holy Land.

The Episcopal Diocese of Jerusalem shares in that decline as its members face increasing difficulties such as the 2010 cancellation of Bishop Suheil Dawani's "Residency Permit" and the accompanying order for him to leave the country. That is simply a newsworthy example of things regularly confronted by less titled Palestinians.

Most Episcopalians and most Americans are unaware of the extent of the hardships facing Palestinians and need education on the situation to enable our support. The Presbyterian Church has published two teaching series on the Palestinian-Israeli conflict. One is entitled Steadfast Hope: The Palestinian Quest for Just Peace, and the other, a three-part study guide for the Kairos Palestine issued by a broad representation of Palestinian Christians in December 2009. An Episcopal version of Steadfast Hope, published in 2011 and based on an updated Presbyterian original, is now available and could be used by Council to develop a study plan for the Church.

Funds of \$5,000 to carry out the purposes of this resolution would be for basic materials and resources. Other line items in the budget could be used to assist in this resolution to be determined by Council and staff. Some of the work would be in the Office of Communications, the Corporate Social Responsibility Committee of Council, and the Economic Justice Loan Committee of Council in addition to work done in the Mission Program, both in New York and Washington. Bill White lived a truly Christian life and changed Harford County, Maryland in the process. He was the "Traveling Episcopalian" and attended all ten churches in the county and was well known for his love of Christ and righteous living. He was instrumental in starting Holy Family House in Harford County in 1988 as a place that homeless families could have shelter, training, a safe environment, and a way out of poverty.

Bill White was President and then President Emeritus of Holy Family House then Harford Family House for many years. The National Episcopal Church declared Harford Family House as a Jubilee Ministry. Bill White constantly helped the homeless: eating with them in soup kitchens, visiting them in their camps, and bringing them spiritual grace and what food he could. He weekly visited about seven homeless camps. Bill White helped start the Cursillo movement in Maryland, attending Maryland Episcopal Cursillo #1, serving on many teams throughout the years and serving his final team on Maryland Episcopal Cursillo #100 in May 2011 just before his death. Bill was known as a holy man who was quick with prayer and had an unmatched thirst for living and loving and a touch of the Holy Spirit as shown by his spiritual depth and enthusiasm for the holy life.

EXPLANATION

The office of Suffragan Bishop was a creation of the Church of England, and it flourished from the mid-13th Century through the 16th Century but was revived in 1870. Under the English practice, the suffragan's commission expired upon the end of the term of the diocesan, and he would have to be reappointed, or not, by the successor. The Episcopal Church largely resisted the establishment of such an office because of the possibility of a suffragan continuing in such a situation without being attached to a diocese. In 1829, a canon specifically prohibiting suffragan bishops was enacted. (Edwin White & Jackson Dykman, Annotated Constitution and Canons (1981), pp. 58–60)

Following the revival of suffragans in England in 1870, several proposals were presented to General Convention to authorize them in The Episcopal Church, but no authorization was enacted until 1910. Spurred by a felt need to provide a form of auxiliary bishop for dioceses that "may need this help for special racial conditions," the Constitution was amended in 1910 to provide for suffragan bishops and a new Canon 11 adopted to provide for their election and general terms of service. That canon included as section 5 the provision that "No Suffragan Bishop, while acting as such, shall be Rector or settled Minister in charge of a Parish or Congregation" -

substantially the same text as now appears in Canon III.11.10(b)(5). (Id. pp. 752-54) "When the canon on suffragan bishops was first being considered in the committee on canons of the House of Deputies, a member of the committee proposed to strike the section prohibiting a suffragan bishop, while acting as such, from having charge of a parish as rector or settled minister thereof, stating that he did so at the request of the bishop of his diocese, who desired to have two clergymen, rectors of parishes in his diocese, elected as suffragans, and for the purpose only of assisting him in administering the rite of confirmation. As one purpose of this section was to prevent any such misuse of the canon, the committee refused to consider the proposition."(Id. p. 760) In the Church of England, however, both originally and after the revival in 1870, suffragans were supported not by their diocese but by being appointed to parishes or other benefices instead, which made their cost to the diocese "negligible". While centralized funding began in the mid-20th Century, much of the funding of English suffragans comes from nondiocesan sources. (Colin Podmore, Dioceses and Episcopal Sees in England: A Background Report for the Dioceses Commission (2008), pp. 71–74) Moreover, in 1910 there were little restrictions on how a diocesan bishop might select a suffragan; there only was a requirement that the suffragan be elected by dioceses with the consent of the bishop. Today, Canon III.11.1(a) requires specifically for suffragans (and not for diocesans or coadjutors) that each diocese "shall establish a nominating process either by Canon or by the adoption of rules and procedure for the election of the Bishop Suffragan at a regular or special Diocesan Convention with sufficient time preceding the election of the Bishop Suffragan." Furthermore, before an election can even take place, Canon III.11.10(b)(2) requires that "a majority of the Bishops exercising jurisdiction and of the several Standing Committees" give their prior consent, and after that the Bishop Diocesan must give prior consent to the electing convention, specifying "the role and the duties" of the new bishop. Bishops may not merely name candidates and have them rubberstamped by diocesan convention. These procedural safeguards require deliberation and outside consents, to the extent that the objections raised in the 1910 General Convention should no longer be an issue. Currently in The Episcopal Church, there is no prohibition on Bishops Diocesan, Bishops Coadjutor, Assistant Bishops, or Missionary Bishops from serving also as priest in charge of a congregation — only Bishops

Suffragan. Whatever the historical reasons for this anomaly, there appears to be little reason for its continuation. In these straitened financial days, if a diocese can responsibly extend its episcopal ministry by having a Bishop Diocesan or Coadjutor serve also as a parish rector, why not also a Bishop Suffragan?

As we continue to grow in our understanding and embrace of all human beings, it is important for us to be specific in our naming of difference. This proposed revision is based upon our increased understanding and practice to respect the human dignity of transgender people - transsexuals, and others who differ from majority societal gender norms. Gender identity (one's inner sense of being male or female) and expression (the way in which one manifests that gender identity in the world) should not be bases for exclusion, in and of themselves, from consideration for participation in the ministries of the Church.

In a study funded by the National Institute of Health and published in the American Journal of Public Health, November 2009, epidemiologists at the University of Pennsylvania School of Medicine found that, on average, guns did not protect those who possessed them from being shot in an assault; people carrying a gun were 4.5 times more likely to be shot in an assault than those not carrying a gun.

In state legislatures across the country, gun activist groups are bringing pressure for laws allowing concealed weapons permits to carry guns into houses of worship. Governor Bobby Jindal of Louisiana signed such a bill into law in 2010. The 22th US Circuit Court of Appeals in Atlanta, Georgia heard arguments in April 2012 to overturn a 2010 law against weapons in religious establishments. In fact, guns can be brought into places of worship in Georgia under current law, with approval of the leaders of the institution, as long as firearms are secured.

In other states, such as Utah, it remains unlawful with or without a permit to carry a firearm in churches if posted. Laws vary from state to state, but posting Gun Free Zone decals is one way for parishes and dioceses to exercise private property rights on behalf of community safety.

Posting of this status shall be easily visible for parishioners, staff and visitors to see as they enter the building.

EXPLANATION

This resolution intends to urge the President to advocate for law enforcement protocols to bring terrorists to justice. The resolution also urges the General Convention of the Episcopal Church to articulate Christian standards for just response to the crime of terrorism.

The Church upholds the Baptismal Covenant which acknowledges the dignity of every human being. This resolution insists that terrorists are held accountable for their actions, but are not dehumanized. Our principles must hold even in the most difficult circumstances.

Prior to the tragic terrorist attacks of September 11, 2001, the United States, like most nations, treated terrorism as a crime. Conventional law enforcement protocols established national and international standards for just responses to terrorist acts. The post 9/11 paradigm shift from law enforcement to waging war on terror has unleashed widespread moral confusion. Many Christians are uncertain about the morality of actions such as preventive wars on states suspected of sponsoring terrorism, military occupation to support regime change, use of torture, secret military tribunals involving suspension or denial of prisoners' legal rights, widespread civilian "collateral damage," and the corrosive impact of the Patriot Act on U.S. citizens' civil rights. Just War Theory, the historic Christian paradigm for understanding when and how Christians may justly wage war,

presumes war occurs between sovereign nations over territorial disputes. That model consequently offers little help in shaping ethical counterterrorism responses. The pacifist perspective opposes war on terror, yet the public knows that some action is necessary; terrorists will strike again unless stopped.

EXPLANATION

The provinces of The Anglican Communion have spent considerable time and effort in assembling, reviewing and offering input to the proposed Anglican Communion Covenant. After extensive study and input from individuals, parishes and dioceses under the guidance of the Executive Council D20 Task Force the task force issued its report called "Executive Council D020 Task Force on the Response to the Anglican Covenant" found on p. 633 of the Blue Book. This report emphasizes that it is clear that the vast majority of those who responded to request for feedback are not in favor of adopting the covenant in its entirety. The task force also states "It has become apparent to this committee in the course of its work that the church requires a new study of the foundations and boundaries of our polity and governance as we seek to deepen our Communion-wide engagement and equip the leadership of the church." The task force goes on to suggest the appointment of a new task force to study how the adoption of the Anglican Covenant would affect the Constitution and Canons of The Episcopal Church as well as issues concerning our identity and what continued engagement with other churches in the communion around issues of unity would be helpful. The Executive Council then submitted Resolution A126 to the 77th General Convention for consideration.

We commend the work of the D20 Task Force but feel it is time that we focus within the Anglican Communion on what is truly important regarding our ministry in this world. We feel that continued litigation regarding the administration of our 38 autonomous, self-governing member provinces is not helpful and consumes our time and energies that would be more effectively channeled to the work of mission. As stated so well by the Diocese of Michigan "The Covenant that binds us together is the mutuality of our ministry and accountability conferred in Baptism."

We therefore propose that through this Resolution that The Episcopal Church take a leadership role in living out "A Covenant for Communion in Mission " as developed by the Inter Anglican Standing Commission on Mission and Evangelism (IASCOME) and that The Episcopal Church urge the other 37 provinces of the Anglican Communion to also adopt this covenant as proposed in the ACC resolution found in Attachment A...

A Covenant For Communion In Mission

This Covenant signifies our common call to share in God's healing and reconciling mission for our blessed but broken and hurting world.

In our relationships as Anglican sisters and brothers in Christ, we live in the hope of the unity that God has brought about through Jesus in the power of the Holy Spirit.

The preamble recognizes that the world is one that has been graced by God but that God's work through Jesus, empowered by the Holy Spirit, is to seek to heal its hurts and reconcile its brokenness. The preamble reminds us that as Christians we are called to share our relationships in the mission of God to the wider world, bearing witness to the kingdom of love, justice and joy that Jesus inaugurated.

The nine points of the covenant are predicated on Scripture and the Sacraments providing the nourishment, guidance and strength for the journey of the covenant partners together.

Nourished by Scripture and Sacrament, we pledge ourselves to:

1. Recognize Jesus in each other's contexts and lives

The nine points begin with Jesus Christ, the source and inspiration of our faith and calls for those covenanting for mission to look for, recognize, learn from and rejoice in the presence of Christ at work in the lives and situations of the other.

- 2. Support one another in our participation in God's mission Point two acknowledges that we cannot serve God's mission in isolation and calls for mutual support and encouragement in our efforts.
- 3. Encourage expressions of our new life in Christ Point three asks those who enter into the covenant to encourage one another as we develop new understandings of our identities in Christ.
- 4. Meet to share common purpose and explore differences and disagreements

Point four provides for face-to-face meetings at which insights and learnings can be shared and difficulties worked through.

5. Be willing to change in response to critique and challenge from others

Point five recognizes that as challenges arise changes will be needed as discipleship in Christ is deepened as a result of both experience in mission and encounters with those with whom we are in covenant.

- 6. Celebrate our strengths and mourn over our failures Point six calls for honoring and celebrating our successes and acknowledging and naming our sadness and failures in the hopes of restitution and reconciliation.
- 7. Share equitably our God-given resources

Point seven emphasizes that there are resources to share – not just money and people, but ideas, prayers, excitement, challenge, enthusiasm. It calls for a move to an equitable sharing of such resources particularly when one participant in the Covenant has more than the other.

8. Work together for the sustainability of God's creation

Point eight underscores that God's concern is for the whole of life – not just people, but the whole created order – and so we are called to strive to safeguard the integrity of creation and to sustain and renew the life of the earth.

9. Live into the promise of God's reconciliation for ourselves and for the world

This last point speaks of the future hope towards which we are living, the hope of a reconciled universe - in which 'God's will be done on earth as it is in heaven' for which Jesus taught us to pray.

We make this covenant in the promise of our mutual responsibility and interdependence in the Body of Christ.

The conclusion provides a strong reminder that we need each other. We are responsible for each other and we are mutually interdependent in the Body of Christ.

IASCOME proposes that the ACC commend the Covenant for Communion in Mission to the churches of the Communion for study and action and remits it to the next IASCOME for evaluation of its reception in the Anglican Communion. IASCOME further proposes that the ACC advance the Covenant for Communion in Mission to the bodies of the Anglican Communion tasked to continue consideration of covenants for the Anglican Communion as commended by the Windsor Report and the "Communiqué" of the February 2005 Primates' Meeting. To that end, IASCOME presents the following resolution for adoption by ACC-13:

ACC RESOLUTION - This Anglican Consultative Council:

- 1. Commends the Covenant for Communion in Mission to the churches of the Anglican Communion for study and application as a vision for Anglican faithfulness to the mission of God;
- 2. Advances the Covenant for Communion in Mission to the bodies of the Anglican Communion tasked to continue consideration of covenants for the Anglican Communion as commended by the Windsor Report and the "Communiqué" of the February 2005 Primates' Meeting;
- 3. Remits the Covenant for Communion in Mission to the next Inter-Anglican Standing Commission on Mission and Evangelism for monitoring responses to and evaluating effectiveness of the Covenant for Communion in Mission across the Anglican Communion.

The covenant is deliberately general in its principles. In its understanding of mission it builds on the Five Marks of Mission of the 1984 and 1990 Anglican Consultative Councils¹. It provides a framework within which those entering into the covenant can identify specific tasks and learning's that relate to their particular situations.

EXPLANATION

Churches of the Anglican Communion have been asked to adopt the proposed Anglican Communion Covenant. The suggestion for such an agreement was made in the 2004 Windsor Report, which recommended "the adoption by the churches of the Communion of a common Anglican Covenant which would make explicit and forceful the loyalty and bonds of affection which govern the relationships between churches of the Communion."

The Windsor Report was produced at the request of Primates upset with the impending consecration of Gene Robinson as Bishop of New Hampshire and the promulgation of a liturgy for the blessing of same-sex unions by the Diocese of New Westminster in the Anglican Church of Canada.

Archbishop Drexel Gomez, of the Anglican Province of the West Indies, was entrusted with leading the

development of the first draft of a covenant. This same Archbishop Gomez was one of the editors of "To Mend the Net", a collection of essays dating from 2001 and advocating enhancing the power of the Anglican Primates to deter, inter alia, the ordination of women and "active homosexuals," as well as the blessing of same-sex unions. Archbishop Gomez's punitive agenda remains evident in the final draft of the proposed Covenant. Despite protestations to the contrary, the proposed Anglican Communion Covenant attempts to create a centralized authority that would constrain the self-governance of The Episcopal Church and other churches of the Communion. This unacceptably inhibits Communion churches from pursuing the gospel mission as they discern it.

The Church of England has already declined to adopt the Anglican Communion Covenant. The House of Bishops of the Episcopal Church in the Philippines has indicated that they will not support the Covenant, and the rejection of the Covenant by the Tikanga Maori of the Anglican Church in Aoteroa, New Zealand and Polynesia renders it virtually certain that those churches will also decline to adopt.

The deficiencies of the proposed Covenant would lead to an Anglican Communion further divided rather than more unified. Declining to adopt the proposed Anglican Communion Covenant not only avoids permanent, institutionalized division, it opens the way for new opportunities to build relationships across differences through bonds of affection, by participation in the common mission of the gospel, and by consultation without coercion or intimidation.

While the former has garnered little support, the Continuing Indaba has borne significant fruit even in its initial phase. Like the proposed Covenant, it recognizes the reality of strong differences of opinion within the family of autonomous churches that make up the Communion, but rather than attempting to regulate or suppress these differences, the Continuing Indaba develops a practical way to use them as the opportunity for deeper engagement. The goal of the program is "Conversation across difference to empower mission." This resolution graciously recognizes Archbishop Williams' efforts as he retires; commends the Continuing Indaba as a principal way forward in dialogue and building and fostering relationships, and urges us to make use of the existing structures of the Anglican Communion — not as means of regulation but as

forums for dialogue and engaging in mission with our brothers and sisters around the world.

EXPLANATION

Canon IV.16(A) provides procedures for formally deposing a Bishop who has renounced or otherwise abandoned the doctrine, discipline, or worship of The Episcopal Church. Last Convention's revision of Title IV carried over the last sentence of Section 2 from the prior Canon IV.9.2, which dates back to 1904. In 1904, suffragan bishops were not entitled to vote in the House of Bishops, nor were any retired bishops unless their resignation was from "advanced age or bodily infirmity". (Edwin White & Jackson Dykman, Annotated Constitution and Canons (1981), pp. 19–20, 1078–1082.) Today, however, the classes of bishops and retired bishops entitled to vote have been expanded to those now specified in Constitution Art. I.2. Even in 1904, however, "Bishops who have resigned their jurisdictions" and foreign missionary bishops were excluded from the number required for a quorum (White & Dykman, p 20).

A supermajority of "a majority of the whole number of Bishops entitled to vote" —rather than a majority of those present, if a quorum — was required by the Constitution in 1904 for amendments to the Book of Common Prayer and for amendments to the Constitution (Id. pp. 134, 140–41). Since then, these two requirements have

been tempered by replacing that clause by "a majority of all Bishops, excluding retired Bishops not present, of the whole number of Bishops entitled to vote".

These three instances are the only requirements in the Constitution and Canons for a vote of a majority "of the whole number of bishops", and the Title IV section is the only one that has not yet been amended to require that retired bishops not present be included in the count for action by a majority. As it stands, retired absent bishops are not required for a quorum of the House of Bishops, but their number is required for action by that House under the language of the Canon as it stands.

The present language has been interpreted by the Chancellor to the Presiding Bishop and ruled by the Presiding Bishop in the case of the deposition of Bishop Robert W. Duncan to require the vote of a majority of those present, if a quorum. While this ruling was based on the unquestioned practice of the House of Bishops in prior such cases, it would be better to remove ambiguity and formally amend the canon in question.

Under current U. S. law, a U. S. citizen or legal permanent resident is permitted to sponsor his/her spouse, child, or parent for immigration, but U. S. citizens and legal permanent residents are not permitted to sponsor their same-gender partners. In part because of federal restrictions in the Defense of Marriage Act (DOMA) enacted in 1996, immigration spousal benefits are not recognized even for same-gender couples who are married or joined in civil unions or domestic partnerships in states where those relationships are legally recognized. Nineteen other countries do allow gay/lesbian citizens to sponsor their partners in the immigration process, including Canada, Brazil, the Netherlands, Belgium, and Spain. There is legislation ("Uniting American Families Act," Senate Bill 821 and House Bill 1537) pending in Congress in both houses that would allow a citizen or legal permanent resident to sponsor his/her same-gender domestic partner or spouse for immigration (source: http://immigrationequalityactionfund.org/legislation/).

Approximately 36,000 bi-national gay and lesbian families live in the United States, and they are raising more than 17,000 children (source: www.immigrationequality.org/about). The inability of U.S. citizens and legal permanent residents to sponsor their same-gender partners forces many families to move abroad or live apart, uprooting children, disrupting careers, and breaking ties with family, co-workers, communities, and places of worship, including Episcopal congregations across the United States. The Episcopal Church has rightly stood

in solidarity with immigrants over many years; this resolution would extend the General Convention's explicit support and prayerful concern to lesbian and gay immigrants and their families who are facing unequal treatment under the law.

EXPLANATION

In an age of technology and rapid communication, the church needs to network, collaborate and share ideas, become more nimble, and have the ability to respond quickly to 21st century ministry opportunities. Much expertise for new and innovative ministry is already being done on the local level but needs broader exposure to show successful models of ministry to the rest of the church. By creating a centralized deposit point, information and resources can be shared in seconds instead of years. The Church Center structure is uniquely positioned to gather that information, organize it, and give it churchwide exposure. It can also vet and give grants to technologically "connect" the entire church and its institutions, especially the underserved and underrepresented constituents. It is the intention of the proposer not to put a dollar amount on this, as the Office of Communications already has a budget and should use existing funds to implement this resolution by reallocating their funds.

Case Example:

The Abundant Table www.theabundanttable.org founded in 2009 by Ms. Sarah Nolan and the Rev. Julie Morris, in partnership with local DeBusschere Family Farms and a ministry of the Diocese of Los Angeles, developed the Abundant Table Farm Project (ATFP), a one to two year internship for young adults to work on an organic farm, live in intentional community, and engage in community justice building.

Organic food and farming has become a national interest of returning to the land and living a more intentional lifestyle. Working the land is a spiritual experience to many who feel that it feeds their spirit and allows them to grow closer to God. The Abundant Table has creatively found a ministry that serves its farming community while seamlessly providing it as a spiritual experience. ATFP actually encompasses all 5 Marks of Mission.

Under the TRaN model The Abundant Table could be a featured ministry for one month with a video, website and contact information. Interested parties would then become aware of the existence of this ministry model and then network with ATFP and possibly other farming projects on how to start a similar project thus shortening their learning curve based on others expertise. ATFP would then be listed under the "farming" category or where ever it makes sense so that it becomes a churchwide resource. Other farming projects would also get listed as time goes on.

According to the United States Government Accountability Office (GAO), there are 1,138 statutory provisions in which marital status is a factor in determining benefits, rights, and privileges. These rights and responsibilities apply to only male-female couples because the 1996 Defense of Marriage Act (DOMA) defines marriage as only between a man and a woman. Currently there are seven states and jurisdictions representing thirteen dioceses where civil marriage is equally available to both opposite and same-sex couples. And a number of federal courts have ruled that DOMA is unconstitutional for failing to provide equal protection and unfairly disadvantaging legally married same-sex couples.

The Episcopal Church has a long history of supporting equal civil protections for same-sex couples, including opposing federal or state constitutional amendments prohibiting same-sex marriage (GC2006-A095). Urging Congress to end discrimination against same-sex marriages is not only in alignment with prior actions of General Convention, it is in alignment with our baptismal promise to strive for justice and to protect the dignity of every human being.

As transgender people and their families increasingly come out within or find their way to congregations, their specific naming in our Canons, along with other groups who historically have experienced discrimination, will encourage congregations to deepen their understanding and widen their welcome, that we all might be empowered "to seek and serve Christ in all persons, loving our neighbors as ourselves."

The translation is easy for unskilled lectors to read, and easy for listeners to understand. This text reflects mainstream interpretations in current, everyday English. This translation is quite sensitive to the translation of the Greek word hoi Ioudaioi commonly translated as "the Jews" with words such as "the Jewish leaders", "the leaders", "the people" so as to lessen the chance of an anti-Jewish misunderstanding of the readings. (Also refer to Resolution A 058 Continue Addressing Christian Anti-Judaism) The Global edition substitutes the metric system for the English system of measurements.

EXPLANATION

In the fall of 2011 the suicide of Rutgers University student Tyler Clementi, followed by numerous others, opened the eyes of people across the country to the widespread and longstanding problem of bullying. Untold numbers of young people – people whose sexual orientation or gender expression, whose skin color or body size, whose clothing or religious practices mark them as different from their peers -- often suffer in isolation, forever scarred by their experiences. For far too long bullying has been viewed as a kind of inevitable "rite of passage" that those who are different should learn simply to survive.

As Christians we can do more than to say "it gets better," powerful as the video project of that name has been. We can help make it so in the here and now. Christ calls us to welcome the stranger, to bind up the brokenhearted, to be agents of reconciliation, healing, and empowerment in this world. Working together, we can help transform the perilous, expanding terrain of the transition from childhood to adulthood. Our churches can be—as indeed many already are—spaces where young people can come to know what a blessing it is to be the people God has created them to become, and where adults can be equipped to support and celebrate this growth.

Committing to a churchwide response to end bullying will equip congregations and institutions with resources and partnerships to live out the baptismal promise to respect the dignity of every human being as we minister to the at-risk youth in our communities.

EXPLANATION

The Church is entering a period of transition in which we are re-visioning Church and reviewing the roles of all churchwide activities. We are not yet ready to launch a churchwide major fundraising initiative. The lessons from the aborted Mission Funding initiative have not been shared with the Church. Over about six years, the Mission Funding office is reported to have raised about \$355,000, well below the average annual expenses of this effort. The annnounced goal for Mission Funding was \$250 million but no feasibility study was done, nor was a timeframe established in which to raise this amount, further evidence of the need for a well planned effort.

We can leverage the capabilities of our existing development offices, The Episcopal Church Foundation, Episcopal Relief and Development and The Episcopal Church Building Fund. We can build on their expertise rather than create an additional, new, and very costly, churchwide organization that duplicates efforts and costs that we cannot afford. Strengthening them can achieve the same result without needing to draw \$3.7 million from the endowment.

EXPLANATION

The Episcopal Church has never had a Churchwide Development Office charged with securing the resources needed for the diverse and growing mission of the Church at all levels. Many Episcopal organizations whose ministries fall outside the scope of operations of Episcopal Relief & Development and the Episcopal Church Foundation have had nowhere to turn for advice and assistance with their fundraising efforts.

Just in the past year, the Development Office has come to the aid of

- the Diocese of Haiti
- the Historically Black Episcopal Colleges and Universities
- the Tri-Faith Initiative
- the College for Bishops
- the Diocese of Costa Rica
- the development directors, clergy and lay leaders of a number of dioceses
- a self-identified donor of a property valued in the multimillion-dollar range

These projects were taken on as additional (and often urgent) assignments, with the major focus of the office remaining on identifying and researching major prospects to support the campaign for the new Episcopal Archives and Mission Research Center.

The Development Office's efforts on behalf of the Diocese of Haiti follow the successful grassroots campaign conducted by the Episcopal Church Foundation. The direction of this effort now shifts to a major donor campaign, and to funding self-sufficient plans for the reconstruction of the Holy Trinity Cathedral complex, which includes Holy Trinity elementary and secondary school – one of the most highly regarded schools in the country; Holy Trinity Music School, the home of Haiti's only orchestra; and St. Vincent's School for the Handicapped, the first school for the disabled in Haiti, currently planning to increase its capacity to provide for the education and care of its students.

Unlike other mainstream Christian denominations (e.g., the Lutheran Church/ELCA and the Presbyterian Church/PCUSA), The Episcopal Church has not traditionally funded or supported a centralized Development Office, and the numbers tell the story: PCUSA total endowment \$1.9 billion; ELCA total endowment \$410 million; TEC total endowment \$217 million.

There is a highly successful precedent for a Churchwide fundraising effort: the Venture in Mission campaign of the late 1970s-early 1980s, which raised \$170 million on a \$100 million goal. Leaders from that campaign and from other Episcopal ministries and organizations across the Church strongly support the establishment of a Churchwide Development Office.

A "visioning committee" of experienced fundraisers and lay and ordained Church leaders met in March 2012 to advise the Project Manager for Fundraising on developing the case statement and defining the scope of work for this office. Members of the committee include:

The Episcopal Church, at its recent Summit on Domestic Poverty adopted a Call to Action to alleviate poverty and injustice in our country.

The late Rev. Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. described the American labor movement as "the first and pioneer anti-poverty program", and gave his life in the struggle to obtain union rights for the Memphis sanitation workers.

In our Baptismal Covenant, we vow to "respect the dignity of every human being", that in the employment context, we are called to ensure that workers have a place at the table and the opportunity for their voices to be heard in determining their wages, benefits and working conditions.

The above and foregoing Resolution is based upon resolutions adopted by the Diocese of Chicago at its diocesan convention in 2011, and also by the Diocese of Olympia and the Episcopal Urban Caucus in 2011.

Adoption of this resolution is not expected to require expenditures that would have an impact on the budget.

113 information is true.

115 *Resolved*, That Canon IV.6.5 be amended to read as follows:

116 Sec. 5. If the Intake Officer determines that the information, if true, would not

117 constitute an Offense, the Intake Officer shall inform the Bishop Diocesan of an

118 intention to dismiss the matter. If the Bishop Diocesan does not object, the

119 Intake Officer shall dismiss the

120 matter. The Intake Officer shall provide written notice to *the subject* 121 *Member of the Clergy*, the Complainant and the Bishop Diocesan of the 122 decision of dismissal, the reasons therefor, and the Complainant's right to 123 appeal the decision within thirty days of the date of the notice and shall send a 124 copy of that notice and the *a* written intake report to the president of the 125 Disciplinary Board. If the Complainant wishes to appeal the dismissal, *the* 126 Complainant shall sign a notice of appeal indicating that the Complainant 127 appeals the dismissal. The Intake Officer shall assist original certified 128 written statement submitted to the Intake Officer and the Complainant's notice 129 of appeal the Complainant in preparing and signing a written statement of the 130 aets complained of, which statement shall simultaneously be sent by the Intake 131 Officer to the president of the Disciplinary Board and to the subject Member of 132 the Clergy. along with a statement that the Complainant appeals the 133 dismissal. The intake report and any related information, in the case of a 134 dismissal, may be retained by the Intake Officer and considered in connection 135 with any additional information that may come to the Intake Officer thereafter 136 concerning the subject Member of the Clergy.

137 And be it further

138 Resolved, That Canon IV.6.6 be amended to read as follows:

139 Sec. 6. In the event of an appeal of a dismissal, the president of the Disciplinary 140 Board shall, within thirty days of the receipt of the appeal, review the 141 intake report and either affirm or overrule the dismissal. The president 142 shall promptly notify *the subject Member of the Clergy*, the Complainant, the 143 Intake Officer, and the Bishop Diocesan of the decision. If the decision is 144 to overrule the dismissal, the president shall refer the intake report to the 145 Reference Panel.

146 And be it further

147 *Resolved*, That Canon IV.6.7 be amended to read as follows:

148 **Sec.** 7. If the Intake Officer determines that the information, if true, would 149 constitute an Offense, the Intake Officer shall promptly forward the *a written* 150 *intake* report to the Reference Panel *and to the subject Member of the Clergy*.

151 The president shall promptly select from the Disciplinary Board, by lot or by

152 other random means, a Conference Panel and a Hearing Panel, and shall 153 designate a president of each Panel. A *The* Conference Panel may shall consist of

154 one or more three persons. A Hearing Panel shall consist of not less than

155 three five persons and shall include both clergy and lay members. The

156 president shall be ineligible to serve on either Panel. Immediately after their

157 selection, the president of the Disciplinary Board shall advise the Bishop

158 Diocesan and the subject Member of the Clergy as to the persons chosen for each

159 *panel*.

161 *Resolved*, That Canon IV.6.10 be amended to read as follows:

162 Sec. 10. All communications and deliberations during the intake and referral

163 stages shall be confidential except as the Bishop Diocesan deems to be 164 pastorally appropriate or as required *by Canon or* by law.

166 *Resolved*, That Canon IV.7.7 be amended to read as follows:

167 Sec. 7. Any Pastoral Direction, restriction on ministry or Administrative 168 Leave under this Canon shall be effective upon service of the writing 169 setting it forth on the subject Member of the Clergy as provided in Canon 170 IV.19.20. *No Rector or other tenured Member of the Clergy shall be denied his*

171 or her compensation and benefits by virtue of the imposition of a restriction

172 on ministry or placement on Administrative Leave.

173 And be it further

174 *Resolved*, That Canon IV.7.11 be amended to read as follows:

175 **Sec. 11.** If a request for review of restriction on ministry or Administrative 176 Leave is made prior to referral to the Conference Panel, then the review shall 177 be conducted by the Conference Panel. If a request for review of restriction 178 on ministry or Administrative

179 Leave is made subsequent to referral to the Conference Panel but prior to 180 referral to the Hearing Panel, the review shall be conducted by the Conference 181 Panel. If a request for review of restriction on ministry or Administrative 182 Leave is made subsequent to referral to the Hearing Panel, the review shall 183 be conducted by the Hearing Panel. The question before a Panel reviewing 184 a restriction on ministry or Administrative Leave is whether, at the time of 185 the review and based upon information then available to the Panel, the

186 restrictions on ministry or Administrative Leave and the terms and 187 conditions thereof are warranted. The review may be conducted either 188 personally or telephonically. The Intake Officer, the Respondent, or the 189 Respondent's Advisor, *the Respondent's Counsel* or both, the Bishop 190 Diocesan, the Chancellor and the Church Attorney shall each be afforded 191 the opportunity to be present, either personally or telephonically, at the 192 review, and any such person present shall be heard by the Panel if such 193 person desires to be heard. The Panel may hear from other persons at the Panel's 194 discretion.

195 And be it further

196 *Resolved*, That Canon IV.8.2 be amended to read as follows:

197 Sec. 2. In each pastoral response the Bishop Diocesan shall consider offering 198 pastoral care to all those *who may be* affected by the *alleged* Offense or 199 allegations thereof. Pastoral care shall be considered for the 200 Complainant, the Complainant's family, the Respondent, the Respondent's 201 family, Injured Persons, Injured Persons' families, *and* any affected Community, 202 witnesses, and the Disciplinary Board.

203 And be it further

204 *Resolved*, That Canon IV.8.3 be amended to read as follows:

205 Sec. 3. In every case, and notwithstanding any other provision of this Title **206** to the contrary, the Bishop Diocesan may disclose such information **207** concerning any *alleged* Offense or allegations thereof or concerning any **208** Accord or Order as the Bishop Diocesan deems pastorally appropriate.

210 *Resolved,* That Canon IV.11.3, Canon IV.11.4 and Canon IV.11.5 be amended to 211 read as follows:

213 in writing to the Reference Panel and to the subject Member of the Clergy. The

214 Reference Panel may meet with the Investigator and shall consider the

233 Resolved, That Canon IV.12.1 be amended to read as follows:

234 Sec. 1. Upon referral of a matter to a Conference Panel, the president of 235 the Disciplinary Board shall forward to the Church Attorney the intake 236 report, all of the Investigator's reports and any other writings or other file 237 materials created or collected by the Disciplinary Board or any panel 238 thereof during the intake, investigative or referral process. From this 239 material the Church Attorney shall prepare a written statement, describing 240 each alleged Offense separately, with reasonable particularity sufficient to 241 apprise

242 the Respondent of the acts, omissions or conditions which are the subject of 243 the proceedings. The Church Attorney shall then forward the materials received 244 from the president of the Disciplinary Board, together with the written statement, 245 to the Conference Panel *and to the subject Member of the Clergy*.

246 And be it further

247 Resolved, That Canon IV.12.3 be amended to read as follows:

248 Sec. 3. The Conference Panel shall issue a notice to the Respondent, the 249 Respondent's Advisor, *the Respondent's Counsel*, the Complainant, the 250 Complainant's Advisor, the Investigator and such other persons, if any, as 251 the Conference Panel in its discretion may determine. The notice shall 252 describe the nature and purpose of the proceeding, contain a copy of the 253 written statement prepared by the Church Attorney, shall disclose the 254 names of all persons to whom the notice is sent, and shall establish a date, 255 time and place for a conference at which the Respondent is to appear before 256 the Conference Panel, *which date shall be not less than twenty (20) days after* 257 *service of the notice upon the Respondent*.

258 And be it further

259 Resolved, That Canon IV.12.4 be amended to read as follows:

260 Sec. 4. The Respondent shall attend the conference and the Respondent or

- 261 Respondent's counsel, or both, shall be heard by the Conference Panel.
- 262 And be it further
- 263 *Resolved*, That Canon IV.12.6 be amended to read as follows:

264 Sec. 6. The Complainant may *shall* attend the conference. but may not be 265 required to do so. The Complainant's Advisor may *also* attend the 266 conference. regardless of whether the Complainant attends.

267 And be it further

268 Resolved, That Canon IV.12.7 be amended to read as follows:

269 Sec. 7. The proceedings of the Conference Panel shall be informal and 270 conversational. The Conference Panel shall describe the alleged Offense to the 271 Respondent. The Conference Panel shall hear from the Complainant or the 272 Complainant's Advisor or both, if either or

273 both are present, and from the Respondent or the Respondent's Advisor or 274 both. At its discretion, the Conference Panel may hear from the Investigator 275 or any other persons present, and may direct the Investigator to conduct 276 additional investigation and suspend its

277 proceedings to allow such investigation to be completed. At its discretion, 278 The Conference Panel may *not* confer with any participants outside the 279 presence of the other participants *Respondent*.

280 And be it further

281 *Resolved*, That Canon IV.12.8 be amended to read as follows:

282 Sec. 8. No witnesses shall be called to testify at the proceedings before the 283 Conference Panel. No record of the proceedings of the Conference Panel 284 shall be made. The conference shall be closed to all except the members of 285 the Conference Panel, and invited participants. Proceedings before the 286 Conference Panel shall be confidential except as may be provided in an Order or 287 Accord or as provided elsewhere in this Title. *No statements made by any* 288 *participant in such proceeding may be used before the Hearing Panel.*

290 Resolved, That Canon IV.12.12 be amended to read as follows:

291 Sec. 12. The Respondent or the Church Attorney may refuse *reject* an Order **292** issued by the Conference Panel by giving written notice of the refusal *rejection* to **293** the president of the Conference Panel within fifteen days following the effective **294** date of the Order as defined in Canon IV.14.10. Upon receipt of the notice **295** of refusal *rejection*, the president of the Conference Panel shall notify the **296** president of the Disciplinary Board of the refusal *rejection* and the matter **297** will proceed as provided in Canon IV.14.11.

298 And be it further

299 Resolved, That Canon IV.13.2 be amended to read as follows:

300 Sec. 2. Upon receipt of a referral for Hearing Panel proceedings, the Church 301 Attorney shall review all information acquired as of the time of such referral 302 and, if necessary, shall revise or update the statement of the *alleged* Offense 303 and shall provide the same to the Hearing

304 Panel. The Hearing Panel shall issue a notice to the Respondent, to the **305** Respondent's Advisor, *to Respondent's Counsel*, and to the Church Attorney.

306 And be it further

307 *Resolved*, That Canon IV.13.4 be amended to read as follows:

308 Sec. 4. All proceedings before the Hearing Panel, except its private 309 deliberations, shall be public, provided, however, that the Hearing Panel 310 may close any part of the proceedings at its discretion to protect the 311 privacy of any person. *No proceedings before the Hearing Panel, except its* 312 *private deliberations, shall be closed to the Respondent, Respondent's Advisor,* 313 *Respondent's Counsel, or to the Church Attorney.* A record of the hearing 314 shall be made by such means as to enable the creation of a *verbatim* written 315 transcript of the hearing.

316 And be it further

317 *Resolved*, That Canon IV.13.5 be amended to read as follows:

318 Sec. 5. The Church Attorney and the Respondent shall each be afforded 319 reasonable time and opportunity to prepare evidence for the hearing as 320 follows:

Within fifteen days after receipt of 340 the initial disclosure by the Church Attorney, Respondent's counsel shall 341 provide to the Church Attorney initial disclosure of (1) the name and, if 342 known, the address and telephone number of each individual likely to have 343 direct knowledge of information which may be used to support defenses to 344 the allegations against the Respondent, together with a detailed summary of 345 the expected testimony of the person, if called to testify; and (2) a copy of, or 346 a description by category and location of, all documents and tangible 347 things that may be used to support defenses to the allegations against the 348 Respondent.

349 (c) If the discovery plan has been mutually agreed upon 350 by the Church Attorney and counsel for the Respondent, the president 351 of the Hearing Panel may approve the plan and incorporate it in a 352 discovery order and scheduling order governing all discovery procedures and 353 establishing a date for hearing of the matter. If the Church Attorney and 354 Respondent's counsel do not agree on all elements of the discovery plan, the 355 president of the Hearing Panel shall allow each to be heard with respect to the 356 elements in dispute, make a determination of appropriate discovery procedures 357 and issue a discovery order and scheduling order within thirty days of the 358 receipt of the discovery planning report.

359 (d) Discovery procedures may include *written* 360 *interrogatories*, oral or written deposition testimony of any person having 361 knowledge pertaining to the Offense *alleged* or any defenses thereto *and* 362 requests for production of documents or tangible objects. and requests for 363 admissions of fact.

(e) In addition to the disclosures required by this section and the discovery obtained pursuant to the discovery plan, the Church Attorney and Respondent's counsel shall each provide to the other and to the Hearing Panel at least thirty days before the hearing final pre-hearing disclosures including (1) the name, address and telephone number of each witness expected to be acalled to testify at the hearing; (2) identification of each document or other around the hearing; and (3) arequests, if any, to have all or portions of the hearing closed to the public.

(f) Notwithstanding any provision of this section, in approving or determining the discovery plan, the president of the Hearing Panel shall take reasonable steps to assure that the discovery process will not unduly burden any person from whom information is sought or unduly adversely affect any pastoral response being offered to any such person. The Hearing Panel may impose, after reasonable notice and opportunity to be heard, reasonable sanctions on any party for failure to comply with any discovery or scheduling order.

380 And be it further

381 *Resolved,* That Canon IV.13.6 be amended to read as follows:

382 Sec. 6. In all proceedings of the Hearing Panel the testimony of witnesses 383 shall be taken orally and personally, or by such other means as provided by 384 order of the Hearing Panel. All testimony shall be given under oath or solemn 385 affirmation and be subject to cross-

386 examination. The Hearing Panel shall determine the credibility, reliability 387 and weight to be given to all testimony and other evidence. The proceedings shall 388 be conducted as follows:

389 (a) The president shall regulate the course of the hearing so as390 to promote full disclosure of relevant facts.

(c) Nothing in this section shall preclude the exercise of 410 411 discretion by the president in taking measures appropriate to preserve the 412 integrity of the hearing. 413 414 And be it further 415 *Resolved*, That Canon IV.14.7 be amended to read as follows: 416 Sec. 7. Prior to the issuance of an Order by a Conference Panel or a Hearing 417 Panel, the issuing Panel shall afford the Bishop Diocesan, the Respondent, 418 and the Complainant each with an opportunity to be heard on the proposed 419 terms of the Order. 420 And be it further 421 *Resolved*, That Canon IV.14.11 be amended to read as follows: 422 Sec. 11. If the Order is issued by a Conference Panel, the Respondent 423 may refuse reject the Order as provided in Canon IV.12.12 and the matter 424 shall be referred to a Hearing Panel for hearing as provided in Canon IV.13. 425 And be it further 426 *Resolved*, That Canon IV.14.12 be amended to read as follows: 427 Sec. 12. Notice of Accords and Orders which shall have become effective 428 and are not subject to refusal rejected by the Respondent shall be given 429 without delay as follows: 430 And be it further 431 Resolved, That Canon IV.15.2 be amended to read as follows: 432 Sec. 2. Within forty days after issuance of an Order by a Hearing Panel, 433 the Respondent or the Church Attorney may appeal to the Provincial Court 434 of Review, by serving written notice of the appeal upon the Bishop 435 Diocesan, with copies of the notice to the presidents of the Hearing Panel 436 and the Province. The notice of appeal shall be signed by the Respondent's 437 counsel or the Church Attorney and shall include a copy of the Order from 438 which the appeal is taken and shall state the grounds of the appeal. 439 And be it further 440 *Resolved*, That Canon IV.15.7 be amended to read as follows: 441 Sec. 7. 485 responsibilities, consequences and alternatives pertaining thereto.

486 (a) The Bishop Diocesan shall make an Advisor available to the 487 Respondent not later than the earliest of (1) *the filing of the intake report* 488 *with the reference Panel; (2)* reference for conciliation, to the Conference 489 Panel or to the Hearing Panel, (2) or (3) the imposition of restriction on 490 ministry or placement on Administrative Leave. or (3) any interrogation

Any Respondent or **504** Complainant may use the services of any Advisor of his or her choice after **505** designating that person as Advisor in writing to the Intake Officer.

506 (e) All communications between the Respondent and his or her Advisor or 507 attorney *counsel* and between the Complainant and his or her Advisor or 508 attorney counsel shall be privileged.

509 (f) The reasonable costs and expenses of providing Advisors made available 510 by the Bishop Diocesan shall be the obligation of the Diocese in which the 511 matter of Discipline is proceeding unless otherwise provided in an Accord or 512 Order. The reasonable costs and expenses of providing Advisors chosen by 513 the Respondent or Complainant and not made available by the Bishop 514 Diocesan shall be the obligation of such Respondent or Complainant unless 515 otherwise provided in an Accord or Order.

516 (g) In all proceedings under this Title at which the Respondent or the 517 Complainant has the right to be present, their Advisors shall also have the right to

- 518 be present.
- 519 And be it further
- 520 *Resolved*, That Canon IV.19.16 be amended to read as follows:

521 **Sec. 16.** There shall be a presumption that the Respondent did not 522 commit the Offense. *It shall be the burden of the Church Attorney to establish* 523 *an Offense by any Respondent*. The standard of proof required for a Hearing 524 Panel to find an Offense by a Respondent shall be that of clear and convincing 525 evidence.

- 526 And be it further
- 527 *Resolved*, That Canon IV.19.17 be amended to read as follows:

528 **Sec. 17.** In all matters under this Title, it shall be the burden of the Church 529 through the Church Attorney to establish an Offense by any Respondent

530 Involuntary Statements.

531 (a) No person proceeding under the authority of this Title may interrogate, or 532 request a statement from, a Respondent or a person suspected of an Offense

533 without first informing that person of the nature of the accusation and advising

534 that person that no statement need be made regarding the Offense of which the

535 Respondent is accused or suspected and that any statement so made may be

536 used in evidence against that person in a proceeding under this Title.

537 (b) No Respondent or person suspected of an Offense may be compelled to make

538 any statement or admission or to testify against himself or herself in any 539 proceedings under this Title.

540 (c) No statement obtained from any person in violation of this Canon, or

541 through the use of coercion, undue influence or improper inducement may be

542 received in evidence against that person in a Trial under this Title.

EXPLANATION

The 2009 revision to Title IV established new disciplinary structures; added numerous new canonical offenses; and stripped Members of the Clergy of fundamental due process rights which under the predecessors to Title IV were intended to provide Clergy facing ecclesiastical discipline with a fair process and a fair trial. This resolution is intended to restore those rights which are critical to insuring Clergy a fair and impartial process, including the right not to be required to testify or give evidence against himself or herself. With only one exception, this resolution does not address any of the new offenses, and does not change the new structures established with the 2009 revision. The Standing Commission on Constitution and Canons (the "SCCC") has proposed revisions to only four sections of Title IV, three of which are also the subject of this resolution. Unfortunately, while the SCCC revisions would reduce inconsistencies between various sections, none addresses any of the issues addressed in this resolution.

Canon IV.2 revision: This section defines various structures and roles in the Title IV disciplinary process.

The first proposed amendment pertains to the selection of the Church Attorney. It provides that there shall be a single Church Attorney selected by the Disciplinary Board. This will insure independence of the Church Attorney who under the revised Title IV represents the Church is not simply the prosecutor.

The second proposed amendment pertains to the "Complainant," as the person or persons from whom the Intake Officer receives information concerning an alleged canonical offense. This proposed amendment would eliminate the possibility of a Member of the Clergy being subjected to a Title IV proceeding, with all of its consequences, as a result of anonymous allegations, which is now possible under this Section. It would restore to the accused Member of the Clergy the right to know the identity of his or her accuser, a right which is fundamental to Anglo-American jurisprudence, and which may permit the early dismissal of frivolous complaints. The revision proposed by the SCCC would eliminate anonymous complaints only with the consent of the person making the complaint.

The third proposed amendment would require that a Conference Panel consist of three members of the Disciplinary Board. This section now permits a Conference "Panel" of only one person. In addition, it requires that the members of the Conference Panel be chosen "by lot or other random means." The Conference Panel has a significant role in the revised structure, and to have that role be filled by less than three members of the Disciplinary Board and to have its members not randomly selected has the potential of denying the right of the accused to a fair and impartial proceeding.

The fourth proposed amendment would require that the Hearing Panel consist of not less than five members of the Disciplinary Board. In addition, it requires that the members of the Conference Panel be chosen "by lot or other random means." The present section provides that it shall consist of three members, which is inconsistent with Canon IV.6.7 which provides that a Hearing Panel consist of "not less than" three members of the Disciplinary Board. The revision proposed by the SCCC would eliminate the inconsistency between the two sections but would retain the language of Canon IV.6.7 ("not less than three"). The Hearing Panel is the trial court. It should consist of at least five members, and they should be randomly selected. The fate of a member

of the Clergy should not be in the hands of only two people.

The fifth proposed amendment pertains to the Intake Officer. The revision would require that there be a single Intake Officer designated by the Disciplinary Board after consultation with the Bishop Diocesan. The present section provides for designation of the Intake Officer by the Bishop Diocesan after consultation with the Disciplinary Board. The Intake Officer has a significant role in the disciplinary process. It is the Intake Officer who makes the threshold determination as to whether the allegations against the Member of the Clergy, if true, would constitute a canonical offense. If the Intake Officer determines that they would constitute a canonical offense, the matter is submitted to the Reference Panel which consists of the Bishop Diocesan, the President of the Disciplinary Board and the Intake Officer. If the Intake Office is chosen by the Bishop Diocesan, he or she will control two-thirds of the Reference Panel, thus denying it impartiality, particularly when the "information" given to the Intake Officer comes from the Bishop Diocesan. In order to insure impartiality, the proposed revision also provides that the Intake Officer not be an employee of the Diocese or a member of the staff of the Bishop Diocesan.

The sixth proposed amendment pertains to the appointment of the Investigator or Investigators. For the purpose of insuring independence from the Bishop Diocesan, this proposed amendment would have investigators appointed by the Church Attorney in consultation with the President of the Disciplinary Board rather than by the Bishop Diocesan.

The seventh proposed amendment relates to Orders issued by a Conference Panel or a Hearing Panel eliminating surplus and ambiguous language.

The eighth proposed amendment relates to an accused Member of the Clergy. It would eliminate designation as a Respondent of a Member of the Clergy who "is asked by an investigator or the Bishop Diocesan to provide information or to make a statement". The language in the present section is overly broad and is contrary to the intended restoration of the right of the Member of the Clergy not to be required to provide information or make a statement against himself or herself.

Canon IV.3.1 revision: This proposed amendment would eliminate the new canonical offense of failure "to cooperate wth any investigation or proceeding conducted under authority of this Title." Under the present Canon, a Member of the Clergy who, on advice of counsel, refuses to give evidence or testimony which could be self-incriminatory, could be charged with this offense. It is of little value to a Member of the Clergy to have the right to counsel, if then denied to follow that advice.

Canon IV.3.3 revision: This proposed amendment would require that for any conduct or condition to be subject to Title IV the alleged offense must be both material and substantial AND of clear and weighty importance to the ministry of the Church. The present language provides for either, not both.

Canon IV.5.1 revision: This proposed amendment would require that the Disciplinary Board consist of at least nine persons, that it be elected by the convention of the Diocese, and that the President of the Disciplinary Board be elected by the members of the Board. The number of members must be at least nine if there is to be a Conference Panel of three and a Hearing Panel of five. The Disciplinary Board is the ecclesiastical court. The manner of the selection of the members of the court and the manner of the selection of the President of the Board is necessary to insure impartiality. The present section is silent on both issues, and in at least one Diocese, the Bishop Diocesan not only appoints the Intake Officer and the Church Attorney, but also appoints the members of the Disciplinary Board and chooses its President. Canon IV.5.3 revision: This proposed amendment would provide that vacancies on the Disciplinary Board be filled by the remaining members of the Board, rather than by the Bishop Diocesan in order to insure impartiality and a fair trial for the accused Member of the Clergy. In one recent case, all of the members of the Conference Panel disqualified themselves and the Bishop appointed the entire conference Panel. The members of the Hearing Panel then disqualified themselves, and the Bishop appointed all of the members of the Hearing Panel. The effect was to have a trial court specially chosen by the Bishop to try a Member of the Clergy for alleged offenses on a complaint brought by the Bishop.

Canon IV.6.2 and Canon IV.6.3 revisions: These proposed amendments give recognition to the presumption that the accused Member of the Clergy did not commit any canonical offense and requires that the "information' provided to the Intake Officer be in writing with a certification signed by the Informant that the Informant believes that the reported information is true. This restores a requirement in the predecessor Title IV to eliminate or lessen frivolous complaints.

Canon IV.6.5 revision: This proposed amendment would provide that the accused Member of the Clergy shall be notified if the matter is being dismissed by the Intake Officer; and that an appeal from such dismissal by the Complainant must be provided to the subject Member of the Clergy.

Canon IV.6.6 revision: This proposed amendment would provide that notice of the decision of the Disciplinary Board on an appeal of a dismissal by the Intake Officer also be provided to the subject Member of the Clergy.

Canon IV.6.7 revision: This proposed amendment would provide that if the Intake Officer determines that the information, if true, would constitute an Offense, the Intake Officer shall forward a written intake report to the Reference Panel and to the subject Member of the Clergy. This proposed amendment would also provide that the Conference Panel shall consist of three persons (it could presently be only one of two persons), and would provide that the Hearing Panel shall consist of not less than five persons. It is now only three persons.

Canon IV.6.10 revision: This proposed amendment would provide that confidentiality shall be subject to Canons.

Canon IV.7.7 revision: This proposed amendment would add a provision stating that no Rector or other tenured Member of the Clergy shall be denied his or her compensation and benefits by virtue of the imposition of a restriction on ministry or placement on Administrative Leave. This is consistent with the historical polity of the Church and recognizes that accused Members of the Clergy are presumed not to have committed any canonical offense.

Canon IV.7.11 revision: This proposed amendment would clarify the requirement that Respendent's Counsel would be given the opportunity to appear before the Conference Panel on the review of a restriction on ministry or placement on Administrative Leave.

Canon IV.8.2 and Canon 8.3 revisions: These proposed amendments would give recognition that Members of the Clergy are presumed not to have committed a canonical offense and that a complaint only contains allegations of an offense.

Canon IV.11.3, Canon IV.11.4 and Canon IV.11.5 revisions: These proposed amendments would provide that the reports of the Investigator shall be provided to the accused Member of the Clergy. Without having the Investigator's Report, an accused Member of the Clergy is not able to prepare a defense prior to meeting with

the Conference Panel, or seek dismissal or an Accord by the Conference Panel.

Canon IV.12.1 revision: This proposed amendment would provide that all materials submitted by the Church Attorney to the Conference Panel also be provided to the Respondent Member of the Clergy.

Canon IV.12.3 revision: This proposed amendment would provide that at least twenty (20) days notice be given to the Respondent of the meeting with the Conference Panel. This will give time for preparation and adjustment of the schedules of the Respondent, Respondent's Advisor and Respondent's Counsel.

Canon IV.12.4 revision: This proposed amendment would provide that the Respondent or Respondent's counsel, or both, shall be heard by the Conference Panel.

Canon IV.12.6 revision: This proposed amendment would provide that a Complainant is required to attend the meeting of the Conference Panel just as the Respondent is required to attend.

Canon IV.12.7 revision: This proposed amendment would eliminate ex parte conferences by the Conference Panel by providing that the Conference Panel may not confer with anyone other than the Church Attorney outside of the presence of Respondent.

Canon IV.12.8 revision: This proposed amendment would add a provision stating that no statements made by any participant in a proceeding before the Conference Panel may be used before the Hearing Panel.

Canon IV.12.12 revision: This proposed amendment would substitute the word "reject" for "refuse." The accused Member of the Clergy has the right to reject any proposed Order by the Conference Panel. It is not a refusal to comply with an Order.

Canon IV.13.2 revision: This proposed amendment would give recognition to the presumption that the accused Member of the Clergy did not commit any canonical offense.

Canon IV.13.4 revision: This proposed amendment would provide that no proceedings before the Hearing Panel, except its private deliberations, shall be closed to the Respondent, Respondent's Advisor, Respondent's Counsel, or to the Church Attorney, and that the Record of the hearing must be verbatim.

Canon IV.13.5 revision: The proposed amendment to paragraph (b) would provide that the initial disclosure of witnesses and exhibits by the Respondent shall be fifteen days after receipt of such disclosure by the Church Attorney. The proposed amendment to paragraph (c) would provide for the use of written interrogatories and eliminate requests for admissions. The former is necessary for the Respondent to be fully apprised of the specifics of the charged offenses and the latter recognizes that an accused Member of the Clergy should not be compelled to make admissions.

Canon IV.13.6 revision: This proposed amendment would eliminate the provision permitting the Hearing Panel to take official notice of technical or scientific facts within the Hearing Panel's specialized knowledge. All evidence must be in the record. This proposed amendment would also eliminate the provision permitting persons other than the Church Attorney and the Respondent to present written statements at the trial. A written statement cannot be cross-examined, and to permit such statements would deny Respondent the right to confront his/her accuser(s) and subject such person(s) to cross-examination.

Canon IV.14.7 revision: This proposed amendment would provide that prior to the issuance of an Order by a Conference Panel or a Hearing Panel, the issuing Panel shall afford the Respondent an opportunity to be

heard on the proposed terms of the Order.

Canon IV.14.11 and Canon IV.14.12 revisions: These proposed amendments would substitute the word "reject" for "refuse." The accused Member of the Clergy has the right to reject any proposed Order by the Conference Panel. It is not a refusal to comply with an Order.

Canon IV.15.2, Canon IV.15.7, Canon IV.15.12 and Canon IV.15.15 revisions: These proposed amendments would eliminate the power of the Church Attorney to appeal from the decision of a Hearing Panel. Only the Respondent should be permitted to appeal.

Canon IV.19.6 revision: This proposed amendment would provide that the Conference Panel may not act in the absence of the Respondent if the Respondent's absence is for good cause and written notice has been given to the president of the Conference Panel.

Canon IV.19.10 revision: This proposed amendment to paragraph (a) would provide that the Bishop Diocesan shall make an Advisor available to the Respondent not later than the filing of an intake report with the Reference Panel, and eliminates the provision for interrogation or request for a statement from the Respondent. The other changes substitute the word "counsel" for "attorney".

Canon IV.19.16 revision: This proposed amendment would merge the language contained in this section with the language in Canon IV.19.17.

Canon IV.19.17 revision: This proposed amendment would restore the right of an accused Member of the Clergy not to be compelled to testify or give evidence against her/himself. It is taken verbatim from Canon V.14.11 of the predecessor Title IV.
